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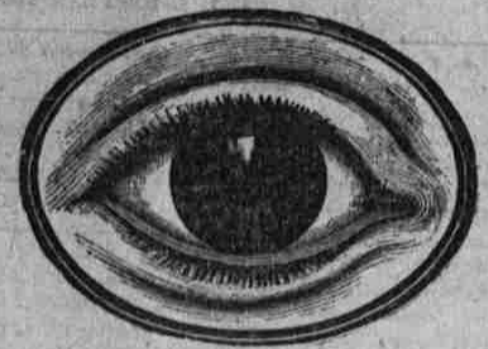

## DIGNITARIES TO COME HERE

PRESIDENT SMITH AND HIGH OFFICIALS COMING.

Expert Pipe Organist Already Here and Tomorrow Morning Will Bring About Sixteen, Including President Smith—Several Apostles Coming.

With the arrival of J. J. McClellan this evening, comes the vanguard of a delegation of 16 prominent Latter Day Saints from Salt Lake city to attend the conference and organ recital at the L. D. S. tabernacle tomorrow night, and Sunday.

Conspicuous among those who will arrive tomorrow morning is Joseph F. Smith, head of all the Latter Day Saints in America. The church head will be accompanied by a number of his apostles, among them George A. Smith and his family. It is not definitely known how many of the apostles will come, but the delegation will total 16. Another church dignitary who will be in La Grande tomorrow is J. R. Winder, first consul to the president. These men will attend the conference and be present at the recital.

## CITY WILL BUILD WALKS

At the meeting of the city council, scheduled for Wednesday evening, July 1, the matter of finishing the cement sidewalks ordered last summer and previously will be taken up. There remain three stretches of walk un-built. One is on the south side of Elm street, between Washington and Adams avenues, in front of the iron works, and the lot belonging to Turner Oliver; another is in front of the feed store property belonging to J. W. White and the residences owned by A. A. Gust, on Adams avenue; the third is that in front of the property belonging to the Rynearson estate and to Niggle Mahaffey, between Chestnut and Fourth streets, on Adams avenue. If the walks are not built by July 1, under the ordinance, the council will call for proposals for the work and if the contract is awarded, the recorder will assess against the property the contract price of building the walk; then the council declares by ordinance the assessment as made by the recorder, which assessment becomes a lien against the property.
