FIVE MEN START RUSH

Last night about 8:20 o'clock, nearly a dozen men were seen to edge toward the door of the United States land office and a few moments afterward there was a sudden "left dress," forming the nucleus of a land office rush on the plan of those seen here last year, but nowhere near the same size. As predicted in the Observer last evening there may have been men here for two weeks or more prepared for this action, but a large portion of those who have spent days here to be first in the line that is to file on the large tracts in the Blue mountain national forest that will be thrown open to entry tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, were "stung." Though they have been on constant watch for days, they were beat by five, who today hold their seats right up close to the door. The evening train brought in a small group—a half dozen or so—from Sumpter under pilotage of Cruiser Sword of Sumpter, but when they reached here they found the line already formed. As a result, they did not take the inconveniences of a 26-hour wait, but preferred to remain in the city, in close proximity to the land office, where they can quickly form in line if there is any material addition to it tonight.

The land which these men seek reaches from the south fork of the John Day on the south and touches Albes on the north. Sixteen townships were thrown open for settlement a month ago and will be subject to entry tomorrow morning at 9:08 o'clock.

For Wrestling Championship.
Seattle, Wash., June 20.—Seattle sports are agog with excitement on the eve of the wrestling match for the championship of the world, between Frank Gotch, the Iowa farmer who now holds the title, and Dr. B. F. Roller of this city. While Gotch is naturally a favorite, there are many who believe that Roller has a good chance to win the belt and a few are backing this opinion with real money. Gotch himself admits that he has tackled a hard proposition in the Seattle man and will have to do some of his niftiest work to win. Roller is 31 years of age and as fine a specimen of physical manhood as could be found anywhere. He is six feet in height, weighs 195 pounds, has a reach of 78 inches and a chest measurement of 47 inches.

Chamberlain to Study Tuberculosis.
Governor Chamberlain of Oregon, has agreed to serve as one of the vice-presidents of the International Congress on Tuberculosis to be held under auspices of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis in the city of Washington, from September 21 to October 12. Arrangements for Oregon's participation in the congress and in the exhibition to be held in connection with it, are in the hands of a committee of which Dr. Pierce of Portland is chairman, and Mrs. Millie Trumbull of Portland is secretary. Other members of the committee are: Miss Cornelia Marvin, Salem; Dr. Andrew C. Smith, Portland; Dr. R. C. Yenney, Portland.
