NEW OFFICERS TAKE SEAT

COURT ACCEPTS ALL BONDS PRESENTED.

With One Exception All Officers-Elect Who Furnish Bonds, Have Done so and Those Who Take Seat Today Have Been Administered the Oath of Office.

There has been a shifting of cogs in the county office machinery today. With one exception, all county officers elected at the June election presented their bonds to the county court which had met for the purpose of acting upon them, took oath of office and were duly installed to their new departments. In the sheriff's office, the treasurer's office and in the assessor's office there was no change, due to re-election and the fact that the assessor does not take his duties until January 1.

Judge Crawford has stepped down from the circuit court bench, and J. W. Knowles is now seated thereon. Sheriff Childers presented a new bond and took a new oath before County Clerk Ed Wright, who had first taken his oath of office before retiring County Clerk Gilham, and as soon as his bonds were accepted, administered the oath of office to County Commissioner J. M. Seider, County Recorder Ira R. Snook, Treasurer John Frawley, Surveyor Curtiss, Coroner J. R. Monk.

The county court has accepted all the bonds given by the different offices, which are:

Clerk, \$10,000; recorder, \$3000; surveyor, \$5000; treasurer, \$20,000; superintendent of schools, \$500; coroner \$3000; sheriff \$20,000. E. E. Bragg does not assume his term at this time.

The Deputies.
In the sheriff's office there is no change in the deputyships. In the county clerk's office the same three men remain except that former Clerk Gilham is now deputy and Deputy Ed Wright is clerk. Claire Scriber continues as a deputy under the new clerk. In the recorder's office Harvey M. Bay is the new deputy under Recorder Snook.

TO PREVENT FROST.

Fresno Man Demonstrates Merits of New Device.

W. H. Smith, representing the California Frost Prevention Co. of Fresno, presents a rather laughable spectacle in the pavilion, where the cherries are displayed, demonstrating his machine, says The Dalles Chronicle.

The thermometer registers between 85 and 100 degrees and in intervals while he is not mopping the perspiration from his face he explains the merits of his machine. The machine is just what its name implies—a frost preventative.

It consists of a thermometer stationed 200 feet from a man's house, so connected with an electric battery and bell in his bedroom that when the thermometer reaches a certain stage—which is arbitrarily fixed by the operator by setting—an electric circuit is completed and a bell is rung so as to awaken the husbandman that he may go to his orchard and light huge lamps of crude oil which create a smudge and prevent frost.
