INTERESTING LIFE OF

J. S. GURDANE, OLD VET

WAS IN LA GRANDE TO ATTEND THE REUNION.

Past Eighty Years, He is Spry and Active—Has a War History That Dates Back to Mexican War—Shipwrecked Walle a Sailor.

A very interesting character is J. S. Gurdane, a veteran of the civil war, who attended the recent reunion in this city. Mr. Gurdane's home is in Pendleton, and he has once been elected to the state legislature from Umatilla county. He is 84 years of age, but looks not a day over 70. He joined the navy in 1846 and served for five years, after having spent many years on the sea. While a sailor he was twice shipwrecked, upon one occasion being in the water for two nights before being rescued. When the war broke out Mr. Gurdane joined the 14th Wisconsin infantry, and was in the battle of Corinth, Shiloh, and in the siege of Vicksburg, and went with Sherman "from Atlanta to the sea." At Shiloh he received a wound in the right leg, and at Vicksburg lost an eye and was shot through the neck, but was not mustered out until the close of the war. Although his life has been thrown in rough places, Mr. Gurdane is now a faithful Christian and an earnest worker in the church of which he is a member. His mind is filled with beautiful sentiments and he loves to tell them to his friends. He is still hale and hearty, in full possession of his faculties, and bids fair to pass the century milestone before bivouacking for the last time.

STRANGER ACTS STRANGELY.

Pendleton Railroad Employees Keep Close Watch on Alleged "Spotter."

A modest looking stranger, claiming to be a retired merchant of a small Michigan town, has created intense interest among O. R. & N. railway employees in this city during the past week, by his deep interest in the affairs of the railroad company when the trains are in the yards here, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

From his watchfulness and regular visits to the depot at the exact time at which passenger trains are due, has aroused suspicions of all the employees at this place and they feel sure that he is a "spotter" on duty in the guise of a retired capitalist.

The secret service department of all the big railroad companies maintain a regular force of detectives to watch different branches of the department, and the detectives pose as all sorts of capitalists, tourists and sightseers and often escape detection for months.

However, the gentleman who has haunted the O. R. & N. depot at train time for the past three weeks has not escaped and for the past two weeks, every employe in the service of the company here has had the "spotter" "spotted," they think.

It was Mr. Taber's dying wish that the young couple should wed, and today the ceremony was performed according to that wish.

One of the uncommon sights it was for a wedding to follow so closely the death of a member of the family, but the dying request of Clark Taber was not to be disobeyed by his daughter. The young couple will make their home in Portland. The bride is well known to most people of Baker and is popular.

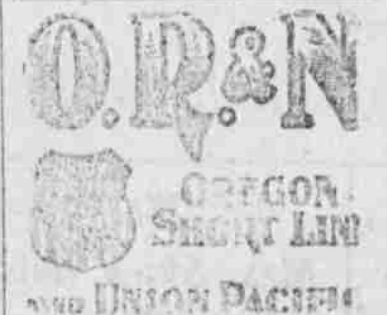
