LOYALTY THAT COUNTS

O. A. C. FLOAT IN RECENT PARADE EXCELLENT.

Special Comment is Due O. A. C., the Maccabees and the Grange Floats in the Recent Parade in La Grande—Many Had Hand in the Framing and Designing.

Those who were engaged in the designing and decorating of the O. A. C., Ladies of the Maccabees and the Grange floats for the parade on the Fourth are deserving of great credit for their loyalty to their college or organization. Although the grange had but one day in which to work after the inception of the idea of taking a part in the parade, the result of their enterprise was an unqualified success. The float was described in detail in another number of this paper.

The O. A. C. students designed a float that was a credit to themselves and to their college. In the little room at their disposal, they accomplished wonders, every department of the college curriculum being well represented. Under command of Captain Ralph E. Reynolds, the float proper was preceded by cadets McCall, Reynolds, McKennon, Eberly, Fox, Day and Spence, and in their natty uniforms they made a fine appearance. Upon the float and helping to portray the different departments were Misses Mabel Tuttle, Ethel McKennon and Miss Combs. C. T. Colt and Jimmie Smith handled the lathe and the engines, representing the mechanical and engineering departments. Dr. C. B. Cauthorn, Frank Lilly and Scott Goodall, "old grads," assisted very materially in the construction and design of the float. The engine, plow and instruments were loaned by Frank Kilpatrick and Arthur Curtis. The loyalty of its students reflects credit upon the institution.

The officers in charge of the Maccabee float were Mrs. R. G. Masterson, Mrs. D. H. Steward and Mrs. Charles U. McLain. Miss Lillian Baker, daughter of Conductor and Mrs. Frank Baker, represented the emblem of the order. She was beautifully gowned in white silk organdie. She wore a crown of gold and carried a silver shield in her right hand. At her left were two beautiful little girls, Virginia Lincoln and Maxine Jolly. Her guards were Mrs. Ethel May, Miss Wells, Miss Ferguson and Miss Klintworth. The flower children were Babe Steward, Lester Masterson, Clarence Hagan, Alonzo Dunn, May Dunn and Louise O'Connell. The crowning glory of the Maccabee float was the eight beautiful children, mere babes, all in white. The float was drawn by four white horses driven by Mrs. R. A. Masterson, who did herself credit as a horsewoman.

Six knights marched on either side. The Maccabee colors, black, red and white, were artistically carried out in the decorations. The float on the whole was one of the prettiest ever seen in La Grande and well deserved the honor it shared equally with O. A. C. and the Blue Mountain Grange.

ADVERTISING FOR FEDERAL BUILDING SITES.

Treasury Department, Office of the Secretary, Washington, D. C., June 8, 1908.

Proposals will be received, to be opened at 2 o'clock p. m., July 16, 1908, for the sale or donation to the United States of a suitable site, centrally and conveniently located, for the federal building to be erected in La Grande, Oregon. A corner lot, of

(approximately) 120x125 feet, is required. Each proposal must give the price, the character of foundations obtainable, the proximity to street cars, sewer, gas and water mains, etc., and must be accompanied by a diagram indicating the principal street, the north point, the dimensions and grades of the land, the widths and paving of adjacent streets and alleys, whether the alleys are public or private, and whether or not the city owns land occupied by sidewalks. The vendor must pay all expenses connected with furnishing evidences of title and deeds of conveyance. Improvements on the property must be reserved by the vendor; but pending the commencement of the federal building they may remain on the land upon payment of a reasonable ground rent. The grantor must, however, remove all improvements on thirty days' notice so to do. The right to reject any proposal is reserved. Each proposal must be sealed, marked "Proposal for federal building site at La Grande, Oregon,"

and mailed to the secretary of the treasury. (supervising architect), Washington, D. C. No special form of proposal is required or provided.
