NEAR-BEER MAKES HIT

The Pendleton Tribune has the following to say of near beer's sale in that city:

Near beer, which is a toothless relative to real beer, has been making its appearance before the dry palates of Pendleton citizens during the past few days. It has responded to a number of encores. The article looks like the real stuff, wears the same ruff about its neck and carries the same air of opulence and optimism. The man who reaches across the bar for it the first time invariably looks over his shoulder to see if any prohibition people are watching him.

The only accessory of the forbidden beverage that does not accompany its successor are vain regrets.

Much of the near beer at present comes from Walla Walla. The breweries of that city were unkind enough to ship it in regular booze barrels which arrived in town like an advance guard of a supreme court decision against prohibition. These barrels were hauled upon heavy brewery wagons from the depots and were flaunted through the streets until they worked up sentiments of curiosity and thirst that could not be resisted. They arrived at their destinations simultaneously with a crowd of eager citizens.

Opinions differed as to the amount of genuine satisfaction a glass of the near beer dispurses.

One of the elect of the bar rooms who professed to know, and backed his profession by the confession that he guessed he would take another, rendered the following minority report:

"Maybe you folks think you are doing something in the new and original line by getting a geometrical angle between your glasses and the bar. But there were other Perry's about you. I have been smacking my lips as a sequel to this near beer for over a year now. I ran across it first in Boston. They called it 'proximity punch' there and had founded another cult on the strength of it.

"Since then I have been going up against it at various parts of the United States. It is the unwrung end of local opinion.

"How do I like it? Well, it's like prohibition itself. You have got to get used to it. It ain't a friend you can acquire by slapping it on the back the first time. You've got to side up to it several times and let familiarity have plenty of time to get spontaneous and reciprocal.

"But it has its advantages. Its whiff keeps the wolf away from the door of many a bartender's home. The main defect with the machine the inventor of prohibition turned out is that it doesn't work the bartender into the tout ensemble. Its that individual for the merces of the anti-suicide bureau. Near beer has been appended as an apology for this disregard. There is a stiff demand for it and the customers who drink it are going to quaff it in the orthodox style with their feet on the railing and their elbows wagging for joy against the top of the bar. They are going to the saloons for it. They are going to put in their orders to a man who has had a lot of vocal training in the art of saying 'What'll ye have?'

"I notice that several of the saloons have opened their doors again in Pendleton? Near beer is the lubricant that keeps the hinges from getting rusty. It also prevents the saloon business from vegetating into innocuous desuetude. And if I were giving an expert opinion on the taste of near beer and had grown asthmatic on conversation, I guess maybe innocuous desuetude would strike it about as close as anything."
