### SMASH HOLY STATEMENT

That the Fulton republicans, or the so-called Fulton-Taft republicans, are going to attempt to stampede the legislature from statement No. 1 and George E. Chamberlain to the election of a republican United States senator,

is evidenced by the movement now on foot to oust W. M. Calkins from the chairmanship of the republican state central committee and replace him with a Fulton-Taft man, says a Pendleton paper.

The desire to oust Calkins does not come so much from a bitterness toward the Calkins who defeated Fulton for the nomination, but for the reason that the Calkins are pledged to the Holy One commandment and would necessarily be compelled to support Chamberlain for United States senator. Until there is an inducement held out or an opportunity offered statement No. 1 men to break their pledges there is going to be no stampede in the ranks and Chamberlain will win easy, so the Fulton men say. Hence, as long as statement No. 1 men are in control of the republican machine there will be no chance for a break, but with a change in the management and discreet wielding of the party whip, something might be accomplished and Oregon might after all elect a republican.

According to the reports from Portland Mr. Calkins is not adverse to handing over the reins of the republican committee to another man, provided he is approached peacefully, but any attempt he may, to force him out will mean a mighty hard fight. It is very probable that there will be some developments within the next 10 days.

### GAVE BEER A WAY HERE

#### FIRST BOOT-LEGGING CASE IN COUNTY RECORDED.

Ed Thompson Arrested Last Evening by Authorities on Complaint by I. W. Faulk, for Boot-legging—Given Fifteen Days in the County Jail.

The first case of arrest and prosecution to come under the provisions of the local option law in Union county was made last evening when a man named Ed Thompson was arrested for disposing of beer to employees of the O. R. & N. in the blacksmith shop of the local round house.

Information gleaned from officials of the company, resulted in Constable I. W. Faulk going to the blacksmith shop and making the arrest. The man was held in the city jail last night and today arraigned before Justice Angus Stewart on two charges, one charging the defendant with selling and giving beer to one Anderson, a blacksmith. The other charge was identical, except that the man named as recipient of the forbidden drink was John Keeney. Before the court Thompson pleaded guilty to giving the beer away. On motion of Prosecutor Hodgkin, one charge was dismissed.

#### Tells His Story.

Before pleading Thompson told his story.

"You see, judge, we had been flopping in de jungles and had to come to town to get some chuck. We hid de four bottles of booze in de grass back of de railroad shack while I went in to get de stuff. When I comes back we all took a pull at de beer, and while we were doing it, dem guys in de blacksmith shop waves dem mitts at us to come over. Well, I thinks how dem guys were swettin' in de warm place and how some booze would do 'em good, so over I goes."

"How often did you give it away," came from Prosecutor Hodgkin.

"Well, you see, judge, we had two bottles, and I takes de first load. When it got around, all dem mugs had got a swaller, but I guess they wish it had been bigger. I didn't know then about your booze laws here, I have been a respectable citizen and don't want to get into trouble."

#### Sentence Imposed.

The first boot-legging case that Union county has seen, cost the sinner 15 days in the county jail. Whether or not the court was influenced by the defendant's ignorance in the law is not known, but the man's story plainly disclosed the motive of giving away the liquor was not to evade the law intentionally, but to slake the thirst of fellow men whom he saw swallowing in the heat. Thompson will spend 15 days as a boarder with Sheriff Childers.

### MERE BOY RUNS AWAY

#### ALSO FACES CHARGE OF THEFT FROM FATHER.

Floyd Warner, Formerly Residing in This City With His Parents, Arrested This Morning While on the West-bound Train—Stole Money to Buy Ticket to San Francisco.

There is today in the city jail a boy of 14 who will be taken back to his home in Boise to face the charge of having stolen money from his father, with which to make his getaway to San Francisco. On telegraphic instructions, Chief of Police Waiden this morning arrested the boy who was a passenger on the west-bound train, and incarcerated the little fellow in the city jail, where he will be held until his father and police authorities reach here, probably tonight.

From the meager information at hand it is learned that the boy took sufficient money from his father to buy a ticket to San Francisco, via Portland. The ticket was in his possession when arrested. In his cell at the jail today, he related how his father had mistreated him continually and that, driven to desperation, he had taken the money and purchased a ticket for San Francisco.

#### Father Known Here.

Floyd Warner is the name of the boy and he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Warner, who formerly lived in La Grande, Mr. Warner being interested in the La Grande Marble Works. The boy is 14 years of age, and was well dressed.

#### To Launch South Carolina.

Washington, July 10.—Another mighty battleship will be added to Uncle Sam's navy tomorrow, when the South Carolina, a sister ship of the new Michigan, will be launched at the Cramps shipyards at Philadelphia. Imposing ceremonies will mark the event. Later the vessel will go to Charleston, S. C., where the people of the state for which it is named will hold a great celebration.

The South Carolina and Michigan represent the initial attempt of the United States naval officials to construct a type of vessel, the principal object of which is the carrying of as many guns of even calibre as her displacement will permit.

The new ship, like the Michigan, has a displacement of 16,000 tons, making it slightly less powerful than the vessels of the British Dreadnaught type, which have 17,000 tons. It is alleged by experts, however, that the South Carolina will be able to fire as many guns broadside as can be fired from the five turrets of the Dreadnaught.

#### Bryce Coming West.

San Francisco, July 10.—It was announced today that James M. Bryce, the British ambassador to the United States, will tour the Pacific coast next March. He will see the whole west for the first time. His object is to lecture at Berkeley before the Pacific Theological seminary.

### WOOL SALE PRICE GOOD

#### WOOL AT ELGIN SALE BRINGS 14 TO 16 CENTS.

About One Hundred and Ninety Thousand Dollars Let Loose in This Section of the State—Many Good Clips Sold—Ends This Afternoon.

Elgin, July 10.—(Special.)—There is considerable excitement attending the wool sales now in progress in this city. Yesterday about 20 clips were disposed of at prices ranging from 14 1/2 to 16 1/2 cents. In all there are about one and a quarter million pounds offered and it is expected that the remaining clips will be disposed of this afternoon. This will place about \$190,000 in circulation in this section of the state.

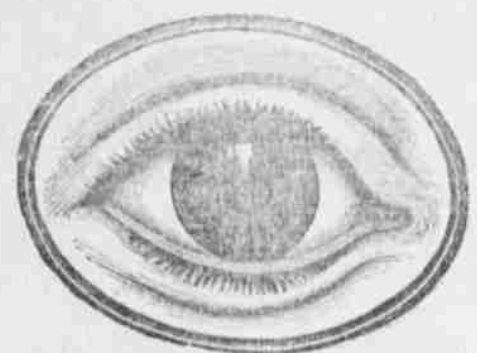
