MORE NEW SIDEWALKS

An unsightly obstacle is to be removed at the corner of Fir street and Adams avenue, when workmen complete the construction of cement sidewalks about the cellar on that corner. For the past year the street there has been blocked with unsightly and even dangerous framework, but this is to be removed in short order, as the walks are nearly finished.

One of those to comply with the requirements of the council without prodding, and by his own volition, is Julius Roesch, who is about to complete the two pieces of walk on Fir street and Adams avenue, and also a long piece in front of the Brewery building. The half block of board walk is to be torn up and replaced with cement, which will complete the entire block along Jefferson avenue.

Arkansas Heresy Hunt.

Texarkana, Ark., July 12.—What will probably become one of the most notable heresy trials that the Presbyterian church has known in years will be commenced today by the Ouachita presbytery, with the Rev. F. E. Maddox, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Texarkana, as the defendant. Dr. Maddox is alleged to have cast doubt upon the inspiration of the Bible and his views of salvation are declared to be heretical.

Dr. Maddox holds that salvation is an evolution from within and not an importation from without, that it is a development of a divinely implanted gift and not a new gift divinely implanted. He holds that men are saved from sin by grace as the child is saved from ignorance by education. As to the Scriptures, he holds that they are inspired, but that they are not in herent. The authors of them were neither reminiscent nor infallible, and there is no proof that they were made so by inspiration.

This trial of Dr. Maddox will make the fourth case in which some of the younger men in his church have had trouble. They have been dealt with either by the local congregation or the higher church authorities, and two or three of them had to leave the denomination.

The present defendant is a very able and scholarly man, aged about 40 years, who has built a magnificent church, drawn around him a large following of some of the most cultured people of Texarkana and section, whose congregation are with him heart and soul.

ADVERTISING FOR FEDERAL BUILDING SITES. Treasury Department, Office of the Secretary, Washington, D. C., June 8, 1908.

Proposals will be received, to be opened at 2 o'clock p. m., July 14, 1908, for the sale or donation to the United States of a suitable site, centrally and conveniently located, for the federal building to be erected in La Grande, Oregon. A corner lot, of (approximately) 130x135 feet, is required. Each proposal must give the price, the character of foundations obtainable, the proximity to street cars, sewer, gas and water mains, etc., and must be accompanied by a diagram indicating the principal street, the north point, the dimensions and grades of the land, the widths and paving of adjacent streets and alleys, whether the alleys are public or private, and whether or not the city owns land occupied by sidewalks. The vendor must pay all expenses connected with furnishing evidences of title and deeds of conveyance. Improvements on the property must be reserved by the vendor; but pending the commencement

of the federal building they may remain on the land upon payment of a reasonable ground rent. The grantor must, however, remove all improvements on thirty days' notice so to do. The right to reject any proposal is reserved. Each proposal must be sealed, marked "Proposal for federal building site at La Grande, Oregon," and mailed to the secretary of the treasury, (supervising architect), Washington, D. C. No special form of proposal is required or provided.
