MRS. EDDY IS 87.

Boston, July 16.—Mrs. Mary Baker Glover Eddy, founder of Christian Science, is today celebrating her 87th birthday. Admirers and followers of the famous religious leader in all parts of the world sent telegraph and cable messages of congratulation. Mrs. Eddy spent the day quietly in her handsome house in Chestnut Hill. Recent rumors to the effect that she is seriously ill are denied and her private secretary declares that she is wonderfully vigorous, mentally and physically, for one of her years. Mrs. Eddy's followers declare that their leader has been persistently misrepresented by a prominent New York newspaper, especially as regards her physical and mental health. When this Journal recently declared that she was ill, because she had failed to take her customary drive, Mrs. Eddy issued the following caustic public statement:
