AMERICANS STILL WIN

London, July 20.—The favoritism shown the athletes representing the United Kingdom by the judges of the Olympic games, threatens to result today in the withdrawal of the teams from several of the competing countries. The Americans are not included in this number, though they have

been discriminated against. France is the leading protestant.

America won five more points today when C. M. Daniels of New York, equalled the world's record in the 100 meter swim, winning first place in the final heat, time 1 minute 5 3/5 seconds. He was opposed in the finals by Dolbalmay of Hungary, and by Julian, from Sweden. These last finished in the order named.

In the catch as catch can wrestling match four good matches were pulled off, all contestants being Englishmen. Press Tompkins defeated Weatherall; Saunders defeated W. J. Cox; Davis defeated Kulkhi, and Samson defeated Schwann.

In the final wrestling matches Mel-

ner American, defeated Press of England, getting first fall in six minutes and 43 seconds; second, 3 minutes and 47 seconds. Cote of Canada, defeated Tompkins of England for the bantam bronze medal, in one fall. They wrestled 3 minutes and 55 seconds, when Rector, American, won in the 15th heat. In the preliminaries for the 100 meter dash today, he equalled the Olympic record held by Jarvis. Time 10 2/5 seconds.

FOREST FIRES

Raging in California—Millions of Dollars of Property Threatened.

Santa Cruz, Cal., July 20.—A serious forest fire broke out near here today. Millions of dollars worth of fine redwood timber is threatened with destruction. It is believed the fire was started by careless campers. It originated eight miles north of the Big Basin. The flames are sweeping across Butano creek, devouring fine forests on Jackson ridge.

The Hottest Day.

BIG EVENT IN QUEBEC

300TH ANNIVERSARY OF FOUNDING OF THE CITY.

Thousands in Attendance—Many Americans Among the Number—United States to Be Honored by Request for Battleship New Hampshire to Fire First Salute to the Prince of Wales on His Arrival—Fairbanks Will Be There.

Quebec, July 20.—Every boat and train into Quebec today brought immense additions to the vast throng already congregated here to witness the stupendous pageant with which the city will this week commemorate its tercentary. Not in its long history of 300 years has the ancient town on the St. Lawrence entertained so great a crowd. All is in readiness for the biggest historical exhibition of modern times, and with the official reception tomorrow to the French, English and American battleships and the distinguished guests, the week's festivities will be fairly inaugurated. The Prince of Wales, now speeding across the Atlantic on the famous mystery ship, the British cruiser Indomitable, will arrive Wednesday afternoon, and his reception will bespeak the regard in which all Canadians hold their future king. Vice-President Fairbanks will be among the distinguished men who will greet the prince and bid him welcome to the new world.

There is no such other stage in the world for dramatic pageantry as the Plains of Abraham, where the grandeur of the natural scenery defies description, and where the 20,000 spectators in the grandstand, face the St. Lawrence, 300 feet below, at the point where Wolfe's Highlanders clambered up the heights.

Many From This Country.

Quebec, July 20.—A thousand tourists from the United States and Western Canada arrived to participate in the celebration. It is expected that the United States battleship, New Hampshire will fire the first salute to the Prince of Wales when he arrives on the British cruiser Indomitable Wednesday. Tonight the French speaking physicians of North America open their congress.

Texas Commercial Clubs.

Galveston, Texas, July 20.—Formation of a state federation of commercial clubs is the most important matter before the Texas-Louisiana Commercial Secretaries' association, which began its annual session here today. Statements that the association will take an active part in politics are denied. A committee of agriculture will seek to secure the co-operation of the farmers of Texas in the upbuilding of the state.

Portland Council.

Members of the city council are practically unanimous in passing all of the ordinances covering the amendments to the city charter which were declared valid by the supreme court Tuesday at the same time. There will be no opposition to the ordinances or if there will be, none has shown thus far.

With the same unanimity the members have expressed themselves in favor of the water bonds. They declare that this ordinance authorizing the sale of bonds for a new pipe line from Bull Run river to the city is the most important of all and are eager to get a chance to vote on it as soon as possible. As soon as a report is received from City Attorney John P. Kavanaugh, to whom the city council gave credit for the city's victory, the ordinances will be drawn up and put through without a dissenting view if the opinions expressed by the nine members who made the trip of inspection with officials of the street railway company to view the streets over which the company desires a franchise this morning, count for anything.

Of the councilmen present on the trip none expressed an opinion that did not favor the immediate passage of all the ordinances that will be necessary to proceed with the work outlined by the amendments. While they recognized the immediate needs of the city for a new pipe line and will pass that ordinance first, they also recognized the importance of the other measures and the general sentiment was in favor of having the city attorney's office draft all the measures and pass them at the same meeting.—Oregon Daily Journal.

Trim Your Trees.

Property owners having trees, the branches of which overhang the sidewalk and streets, are hereby ordered to trim them so they will not obstruct the walks. The limbs should be trimmed off to a height of not less than seven feet from the sidewalk.

MACKENZIE LIKES US

Dr. K. A. J. Mackenzie of Portland, chief surgeon of the O. R. & N. company, spent the day in the city yesterday as the guest of local physicians, and incidentally performed an important operation at the Grande Ronde hospital.

Dr. Mackenzie arrived by special at 8 in the morning, and returned to Portland on No. 5, to which his private car was attached, last night. During the afternoon Dr. Mackenzie was taken for a trip in a motor car, which extended to nearly all the places of interest hereabout, including the cherry orchards above Cove. An inspection of these orchards alone well repay one for the trip. One orchard, that of Mr. George Thomas, will produce a crop, picking of which will soon commence, the lowest estimate on which is \$0,000 pounds.

Dr. Mackenzie expressed himself as being delighted with the Grande Ronde valley. He has lived in Portland 26 years, and has been through this part of the state many times, but never before had any idea that there is in the state of Oregon such an Eden as the Grande Ronde valley.

Dr. Mackenzie also paid a high compliment to those who have been instrumental in giving to La Grande the Grande Ronde hospital, when he said that in his opinion the facilities for the successful treatment of disease, both surgical and medical, are as modern and complete in the city of La Grande as they are in any other city wherever located.

Special Squadron.

Manila, July 20.—The battleship Maine and Alabama, which left San Francisco June 6, arrived here today. They comprise the special service squadron sent in advance of the Atlantic fleet.
