### ACQUIT SHORT LINE ENGINEER.

Was Charged With Manslaughter But Prosecution Failed.

A Welser dispatch to the Boise Capital News says:

Edward Hubbard, a veteran engineer on the Oregon Short Line, was acquitted yesterday of the charge of manslaughter preferred against him on account of the accidental killing of the little 4 1/2-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Grimmett, on June 12, when the boy was struck by an engine and killed. The case was one of the hardest fought in the history of this county. Bowen & Ayres conducting the prosecution, and B. S. Varian of Welser, and J. H. Hawley of Boise, the defense.

The accident resulting in the instant killing of the little boy took place six miles west of the city. Mr. Hubbard was engineer on the second section of the afternoon passenger train. The testimony showed that after the first section had passed, the grandmother permitted the little boy to cross the track after some cows. The distance to the track was about 100 yards from the house, and after the little fellow had crossed, the grandmother, seeing the second section coming, became excited and started toward the track screaming loudly. The boy evidently heard her and started to recross the track, when he was struck by the engine.

The prosecution contended that the whistle was not sounded, the bell rung or the proper look-out kept and the boy's death was caused by this failure.

After the impanelling of the jury, most of whom were ranchmen from Mann's creek, the defense made the demand that the jury inspect the premises where the accident occurred. This was granted by the court and the jury was conveyed to the place in a special car. The defense had the same engine that was run at the time of the accident and the jury experimented with it for two hours, giving an opportunity to see what chance the engineer had to see the boy, and also to investigate other problems of the accident.

After listening to the testimony, the jury retired and on the first ballot reached a verdict of not guilty. A civil suit against the Short Line was commenced a few days after the accident asking for damages in the sum of \$15,150. General Bowen and his partner, Mr. Ayres, represented the boy's parents as plaintiffs. The case is still pending.

### Funeral of J. Muller.

Regarding J. Muller, whose funeral occurred in Baker City day before yesterday, the Baker City Herald makes editorial comment as follows:

The many friends of J. Muller paid respects to the departed yesterday and his remains were interred in the Mt. Hope cemetery. It is a case of a good citizen being snatched from this life without a moment's warning. Mr. Muller was one of the best of men of this community. He was a loyal friend, a splendid husband and father, generous in every way, and an ideal citizen. While unpretentious he has been an active man in public affairs, having served his country in the regular army with credit as a military man. Baker City will miss him. No city can spare men of this kind.
