DAN KELLY AT LONDON

London, July 22.—In sections one and two of the Olympic games, Dan Kelly, American, won first place, with a record of 22 feet 10 1/2 inches. In sections three and four, Dan J. Kelly, of Baker City, Ore., representing the Irish-American Athletic club of New York, won first place, jumping 22 feet 7 1/2 inches. In sections five and six, Bricker from Canada, won first, jumping 22 feet 3 inches.

During the water polo event, an English swimmer, was seriously injured today in making the high dive. This is the first serious injury to any of the competing athletes. Kane's foot slipped as he was leaving the platform. He tried to right himself in the air, but failed, and struck the water with his feet. He was rendered unconscious. Spangberg of Sweden, jumped 22 feet 10 inches. The English swimmer, who was known to a Londoner as M. Remondet, was competing in combined sections five and six in the preliminary to the final event. Kerr, a Canadian, won first place in the first heat of the semi-finals in the 200-meter dash. Time, 22 3/4 seconds. Second place was won by Carmell, the American. In 22 3/5 seconds. Cloughen, American, won the third heat in 22 3/5 seconds; Hawkins, England, won the fourth in 22 3/5 seconds. Dolan, American, made a good showing in the first rounds of the featherweight wrestling.

America added another gold medal to her collection today when Irons, who broke the record in the preliminary heats, won the final running broad jump by 26 feet 6 1/2 inches; Kelly, of Baker City, Ore., was second, and Bricker, Canada, third.
