## PORTLAND NEWS LETTER

### GRANGE ASKED TO VISIT FOO DROADS CONVENTION.

Hartog of Eugene Has Issued Nobby Advertising—Many Counties Are Taking Steps to Have Representative Bodies at Good Roads Convention on August 11—Other Newsy Items.

Portland, Ore., July 27.—(Special correspondence.)—Hon. Austin T. Buxton of Forest Grove, master of the Oregon State Grange, will personally attend the Good Roads conference to be held in the Convention hall of the Portland Commercial club August 11, and he is anxious that each subordinate, or local Grange, in the state, send one delegate, and he requests that each delegate be named at once and report made to W. L. Crissey, at Portland.

"Who said rain" is the latest advertisement issued by Manager John H. Hartog, of the Eugene Commercial club. A Eugene belle is photographed three times, standing in glasses, each of which contains the rainfall for one year, one in Eugene with 28 inches, and the girl's face has a happy expression; New York City with 45 inches, and that expression becomes doubtful, while New Orleans, with 42 inches, makes her cry for help. The leaflet quotes from the report of the United States weather bureau that during 1907 Eugene had 205 days without any rain and 70 days when it rained less than one-tenth of an inch.

H. A. Wheeler, president of the American Silk company, of the same city, accompanied by their families, are visiting the Pacific Northwest. They spent a full week in Oregon and expressed themselves as delighted. They will report their ideas of the country to the three thousand Chicago business men comprising the Chicago Association of Commerce.

The new Giant cherry, a cross between the Lambert and the Bing, created a sensation on the Portland market last week. There were some specimens that measured an inch and a half in diameter.

The Presidential Postmasters' association of Oregon, will meet in the Convention hall of the Portland Commercial club August 7 and 8, and have invited the fourth class postmasters to meet with them. The commercial bodies of the state have joined with the postmasters in inviting Postmaster General Meyer to attend, and arrangements have been made for meetings in Washington and California so that the postmaster general may attend all three with the least possible loss of time.

The active advertising men of Portland gave a complimentary dinner at the Portland Commercial club last week to that veteran advertiser, Mr. Charles H. Fuller of Chicago.

County Judge Goodin, of Washington county, is interested in the Good Roads conference and pledges a delegation of from 12 to 20 representative Washington county citizens. Baker City, Junction City, Eugene, Albany and many other points promise good delegations and there is every assurance of the best meeting ever held in Oregon.

The Ions Proclaimer sent to the Portland Commercial club last week a box containing some of the finest samples of wheat of different kinds ever grown in Oregon. They attracted much attention, and were universally complimented.
