# OUTLOOK IS GOOD

"Oregon is rapidly advancing to one of her greatest possibilities in the way of industrial development," remarked Dr. James Withycombs, director of the Oregon experiment station at Corvallis, "and that is the abundant opportunity for developing the livestock industry, says the Democrat. "We must make more of this opportunity we now have right before us," he continued, "if we are to keep pace with progress."

"Western Oregon affords the finest opportunity in the world for raising fine clover, cattle and vetch and these products cannot be excelled as food-stuffs for the raising of select stock. It is the same old story. We don't know what we have here in Oregon, and we are slow to accept new doctrines or new theories about anything. But at the same time there is not a single industry that I can think of or have in any way come in contact with that presents development as does this one industry. I am glad Portland is going to have a livestock exposition. Its full meaning was presented in the columns of the Portland Oregonian only a few days ago by W. S. Skinner, the founder of the great international livestock show of Chicago, and now one of the leading stockmen of Denver. He is familiar with the situation and sees, perhaps, a little further into the future than most of us do. So, I say, with proper encouragement, Portland will have no difficulty at all in establishing her position as the livestock center of the northwest, and by all means she needs to have a splendid representative show each year."
