## PIONEER IS SICK

The announcement that Rev. A. Eades is now very low in the hospital in Spokane, will be sad news to his many friends of eastern Oregon. Considering the fact that he is 73 years of age and quite feeble, it is doubtful if he ever regains his strength. However, the latest reports are to the effect that he was some better.

Rev. Eades is one of the pioneer characters of the northwest. He was born in Cole county, Mo., November 5, 1829. His family moved from there to Platte county, when Abraham was about 4½ years old, and later, in 1844, crossed the plains to Oregon. When they reached the present site of La Grande, they made camp for two nights near where the Slater residence in South La Grande, now is, and passed on over the Blue mountains and the Cascades to Willamette valley, settling in what is now Yamhill county. He remained at home until he was nearly 25 years of age, when all at once, he became impressed with the necessity of obtaining an education. Prior to this time he could only read in a very limited way. He had accumulated some stock and these he disposed of and entered school, and did not stop until after he had graduated from the Willamette valley. After leaving school he moved to Grant county and taught school for quite a while. Being always of a religious turn he one day stepped into the law office of his old-time friend, the late Col. George B. Currey, who remarked: "Eades, why don't you enter the ministry? Your church (Methodist) needs men of your ability, and you would do the world, as well as yourself, some good." That remark set Mr. Eades to thinking, and in a few weeks he returned and said:

"Colonel, I am going to preach next Sunday morning, and I want you to come out and hear me, and if you think I can make a success, I will enter the work."

The result was, he was soon regularly installed and filled many of the best calls within the gift of his church, and conducted one of the greatest revivals ever held, in Prairie City, where over 260 confessed Christ. He was honored with the office of presiding elder of the Boise district. Was a delegate to the general conference in New York in 1888, and there, as he has said, "made the speech of his life." His effort was occasioned by an attempt on the part of an eastern bishop, to force a resolution making a conference consist of not less than 50 ministers. Mr. Eades arose, and in a few minutes had the august body of dignitaries at his mercy, and succeeded in having the number cut down to 25.

He was the last principal of the Blue Mountain university, and for the past 15 years or more called La Grande his home, and still has a home in South La Grande. His wife passed away a few years ago, and about three years ago, while handling wild horses, he was kicked and suffered a fracture of both legs, from which he never fully recovered.

Rev. Eades always kept himself well-informed on the current topic of the day, was a student, and acknowledged among the best Greek and Latin scholars in the state. It is to be hoped that he will rapidly recover from his recent illness. He left this city a few weeks ago to enter the Old Folks' home, which is conducted by the deaconesses of the Methodist church, but a few days ago was removed to the hospital in Spokane, where he could be better cared for.
