VAN CLEVE'S SLUR CALLS FOR REPLY

HEAD OF MANUFACTURERS ADVISES FLYING OF BRYAN.

Because Commoner is Antagonistic to His Interests, President Van Cleve Issues Strong Circulars—Bryan Will Answer in The Commoner, With Two Thousand Words—Mack Issues the Statement That Bryan Will Repudiate Charges.

New York, Aug. 1.—Norman E. Mack, manager of the democratic national campaign, received word from Bryan that he will reply to the circulars issued by J. C. Van Cleve, president of the National Manufacturers' association, asking the members of that organization and their friends, to "take the hide off of Bryan in the coming election, and nail it to the fence for all time."

Bryan's reply will be published next Friday in the Commoner, and will contain 2000 words. Van Cleve says the onslaught upon Bryan was caused by the Commoner's support of the anti-injunction plank, which was incorporated in the platform against his wishes.

FRENCH LABOR LEADERS ARRESTED.

Paris, Aug. 1.—Gendarmes today raided the headquarters of the general labor federation, and arrested Editor Poughal of the Voix du Peuple, a revolutionary organ of the federation, and Secretary Griffeulshes and M. Marie, prominent members of the federation. They are charged with responsibility for the riots at Vigneux and strikes threatening the welfare of Paris.

GRAY BRIDGE COMPLETED.

Bridge Superintendent J. F. Campbell returned to town last evening, having completed a 150-foot bridge across the Grande Ronde river at the site of the old Wilhelm bridge. The new structure is 18 feet wide, built upon piling and is three feet above extreme high water.

REINSTATE CADETS TO WEST POINT.

Oyster Bay, Aug. 1.—Following a conference with President Roosevelt today, Secretary of War Wright decided to cancel steps taken toward the dismissal of eight West Point cadets who are accused of hazing. Wright said he thought the punishment was too severe for the offense.
