## JULY'S WEATHER.

Worstell, records nothing particularly remarkable except that the highest degree of temperature was reached in the month just passed, of any time since records of the weather were kept. Summary. The mean temperature for the month was a trifle more than 78 degrees, the maximum being 106 on the 31st and the minimum 37, occurring on the 29th. July was not a dry month as the total precipitation reached .86 inches. Twenty-two days were clear, seven partly cloudy, and thunder storms occurred on the 14th, 15th, 21st, 22d and 23d.


