Five Years of Pope Pius.

Rome, Aug. 4.—Pope Pius X today completed the fifth year of his reign as the head of the Roman Catholic church and the day was marked with universal rejoicing throughout Rome and Italy. At the Vatican the anniversary was observed with great solemnity. His Holiness received the college of cardinals in collective audience, the dean reading an address of congratulation in which he wished the pope many more years of pontificate. Greetings were also extended by the several colleges of prelates and all the military and lay officials of the Vatican. Many European sovereigns also expressed, through their representatives, their best wishes and sent handsome gifts. Thousands of prominent churchmen and laymen from all over the world are in Rome, including Cardinal Gibbons of Baltimore, to take part in the celebration of the golden jubilee of the pope's ordination to the priesthood and participated in today's observances.

BURNS CLEANS HOUSE.

Sunday Closing Ordinance Passed and "Redlight" District Removed.

Baker City, Aug. 3.—The Burns city council at the regular meeting last Wednesday evening had quite a business session. The Sunday closing ordinance was passed over the veto of the mayor, but the midnight closing measure was allowed to stand at present, with the idea of modifying it later. An ordinance was passed setting the speed limit of automobiles at six miles an hour within the city limits, but there is talk of amending this and setting the limit at eight miles. The council also talked some of a city park, but no definite action was taken. That would certainly be an improvement that would be much appreciated. It was also ordered that the "redlight" district be cleared out at once and its contents be sent to some more favorable climate.
