POKER TO BLAME.

Pilot Rock Young Man Forges Check to Pay Poker Bills.

Although poker playing and gambling of all kinds is strictly prohibited in Pilot Rock, and in all of Oregon, for that matter, another young man has gone wrong as a result, it is said, of a clandestine poker game at Pilot Rock last Friday night, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

Arthur Van Winkle, who has been employed by H. H. McReynolds, the Pilot Rock butcher, for the past three months, has just issued four checks aggregating \$95, on the Bank of Pilot Rock, and has fled the country, going south toward Ukiah, where he was last seen.

It is said that Van Winkle secured money on the checks with which to take part in a poker game and those who hold checks, feeling that he would have money in the bank to redeem them, delayed reporting the matter until last evening, when it was reported to Acting District Attorney Charles J. Ferguson.

When the checks were offered at the bank Saturday, it was found that Van Winkle had no funds there, but that he had an account at the bank some time before. Thinking that he would return to make the checks good, the matter was not given out.

However, after waiting until Monday afternoon for Van Winkle to return, the holders of the checks notified the acting district attorney and a search for the young man is now being made. He was last seen in the vicinity of Ukiah, Sunday. He came to Pilot Rock from The Dalles, but had formerly lived at Ukiah.

Van Winkle was about 22 years of age and had borne a good reputation at Pilot Rock, where he had been employed in the butcher business conducted by Mr. McReynolds, for the past three months. His action is a surprise to all who knew him and it is not believed that he would have committed the crime had he not been inveigled into the poker game, as is asserted by all who are familiar with the circumstances.

ASIATIC MALADY RAMPANT.

Broad Disease of Beri-Beri Discovered Near San Jose Today.

San Jose, Cal., Aug. 5.—Beri beri, the dreaded Asiatic disease, has been discovered in a colony of Japanese fruit canners in the vicinity of Alviso, near here. Health officers are making an investigation. The presence of the plague was revealed by the death of the wife of N. Haki, a Japanese, three days after he purchased her and two children for \$250.

Thirty-one cases are reported to be in the Japanese camp at the present time.

PRISONERS BREAK FOR LIBERTY

For Three Hours Penitentiary Authorities Are Busy With Bloodhounds.

Walla Walla, Wash., Aug. 2.—For three hours this afternoon two criminals from the state penitentiary remained at liberty while the guards of the institution, the sheriff's officers and the local police, assisted by bloodhounds made a thorough search for them. The men were dressed in their prison garb and the wonder is that they succeeded for so long in eluding the large posse that was on their trail. They were finally caught on lower Mill creek, two miles west of Walla Walla.

The two men were James Casey and Frank Weston. Along with about 150 other prisoners they had been employed on construction work near the penitentiary. The pair had been set to work apart from the others and at an opportune time made their escape. An alarm was sounded, but the guards being busy with the other prisoners could not follow them.

As soon as the other convicts were disposed of, several guards with bloodhounds set out, while the local authorities were notified.

Casey went up from Stevens county for burglary. He was committed to the penitentiary December 7, 1907, to serve an indeterminate sentence. Weston was convicted of forgery in King county and was committed March 21 of this year, to serve three years. Both prisoners will suffer in terms of confinement for their attempt to escape.
