He was last seen in the vi-Pilot Rock from The Dalles, but had formerly lived at Ukiah.

Van Winkle was about 22 years of age and had borne a good reputation at Pilot Rock, where he had been employed in the butcher business con ducted by Mr. McReynolds, for the past three months. His action is a surprise to all who knew him and it is not believed that he would have committed the crime had he not been inveigled into the poker game, as is asserted by all who are familiar with the circumstances.
