MAKE FEW CHANGES.

Attorneys Find Flaws in Tentative City Charter to Recommend Change.

Several minor changes are slated to take place in the tentative city charter. City Attorney J. F. Baker, aided by Attorney C. H. Finn, have gone over the charter as it was reported to the council at the special meeting last week, and they found things which need to be stricken out. The principal ones are those sections dealing with collection of taxes and the qualifications of voters. All changes made will reduce the size of the charter as it will finally be accepted by the council. These changes will be recommended to the council at its regular meeting tonight.

The delay occasioned by these recommendations will be trifling. It is likely that an adjourned meeting will be held early next week and at that time the city attorney will have the correct draft up ready for final passage. In that event it will be possible to hold the special election this month.

Few special features, outside of the routine, are scheduled for tonight's meeting. An amendment to the cow ordinance is one thing which will be given considerable attention.
