CHARTER SATISFACTORY.

Will Be Drawn Up and Acted on at Adjourned Meeting Next Week. At an adjourned meeting set for next Wednesday night, the new charter ordinance will be introduced and passed, as a result of steps taken last evening by the city council.

With Mayor Hall and Councilmen Andrews, Williamson and Curtis absent, the council selected F. L. Meyers as president, and Mr. Meyers will have all powers of a mayor—except the veto authority—until the council meets again. There was the usual amount of routine matter to come up. Special business to be dealt with were the electric power supply and the report of the city book expert, J. B. Eaton. In the former matter, definite assurance was given the council that the Grande Ronde Electric company would have ample power supply in the future, and in the latter the report of Mr. Eaton was referred to the finance committee.

The charter business was taken up. The report of the city attorney was appended to the tentative charter, and after giving the suggested revisions their careful attention, the council ordered the city attorney to draw up the charter ordinance which will be acted upon next Wednesday night.
