LAUDS THE VALLEY

WORTHY MASTER BUXTON
PRAISES GRANDE RONDE.

In Article to the State Grange Bulletin A. T. Buxton Pays Tribute to the Grande Ronde Valley and the Thrifty People Who Live in it.

The Grande Ronde valley is always beautiful, but never more so than now when its thrifty orchards, its broad fields of alfalfa and sugar beets and its waving grain contrast to vividly with the sandy stretches beyond the hills that surround it. The western side of the valley may always remain as the garden spot of Oregon, but the Grande Ronde is certainly fitting to be its front lawn. With its wonderful soil, so much of it sub-irrigated, it seems capable of producing anything that will endure its climate. And a ride through this wonderland soon convinces one that it is making good its promise. The cherry season is now on. Oregon's great fame as a producer of the highest quality of this luscious fruit would not suffer materially if all the cherry sections but this one should be suddenly wiped off the map. They certainly are fine and plentiful. Twenty-five thousand pounds had gone out of one orchard, with two staple varieties still unharvested.

Apples are promising well; the second cutting of alfalfa is just going in; grain harvest is just beginning, and, though a little short of a full crop, still promises well. Sugar beets, the distinctive crop of this valley, are making an excellent growth, and their care is furnishing employment to a large number of people.

The people are busy, thrifty and apparently contented, and who could wish them more.
