READY FOR EXCURSION

Standing Time:
Looking Glass Limited, leaves 7 a. m.
Looking Glass local, leaves at 7:30 a. m.

One thousand people going! That is the estimate made by managers of the Conductors' excursion, which leaves La Grande tomorrow as stated above, for the Looking Glass park, to afford a day of picnic for La Grande people. The detail has been worked out. The 18 coaches are here, the trains will be made up and will leave the depot on schedule time.

During the past week this excursion has been the principal topic of discussion everywhere, and the conductors are already feeling alarmed over the question of handling the crowds. At the other end, everything is in readiness for the picnic. The conductors have arranged for benches for the tired ones to rest on, and have gone to every possible means to insure a comfortable day.

The Looking Glass limited leaves at 7 o'clock and will make no stops. The La Grande band will go with this section. The next train is a local one, and will stop at all intermediate points. Returning, both trains will be local.

OBJECT NO NEAR BEER.

Enterprise Council Charges Usual Saloon License.

The "near beer" vendors will not get a foothold in Enterprise if the council can prevent. Several parties have desired to open up "soft drink" joints in Enterprise, but the license fee is prohibitive, \$400 a year, where bars and billiard tables are included. And to make money—to have the boys line up and shake dice by the hour and drink 50 more drinks of the 1 per cent alcohol stuff than they want—it is necessary to have magnets such as bars and billiard tables to "draw the trade." But at the meeting of the city council Tuesday night the proposition to decrease the license for such places was so unpopular it was not put to a vote.—Enterprise News-Record.

Favorable Reports From Vale.
