PROMISE IS BRIGHT

Bringing picked samples that contain ore valued at \$1000 per ton and reporting the Aurelia group of silver mines giving additional promise after a month's hard labor by a good-sized crew, a party of La Grande men interested financially in the Aurelia mines, returned last evening from a week's inspection of the property. Those who returned are L. Oldenburg, Jess Paul, F. R. Faulk and Mr. O'Connell, a miner employed at the property.
In the Boston claim, a mine of the Aurelia group, a shaft 35 feet in has uncovered a three-foot ledge of ore that has assayed extremely favorable. Aside from this paying ledge the miners have found rich float in the Standard claim during the extension of a shaft which is now about 40 feet long. The ledge which they seek requires a 65-foot shaft. The float found thus far in the shaft has assayed between \$500 and \$800 per ton.
