NEW BAKERY ARRANGEMENT. Roesch & Bunker Lease McKennon Bakery for Themselves.

Since Saturday afternoon J. D. McKennon has no longer operated a bakery, and at present an arrangement is in effect with Roesch & Bunker, proprietors of the Royal bakery, which will meet Mr. McKennon's demands until he lets go of his business to his successors in a few weeks. Until the time that the Pattison Bros. take hold of their new venture, Roesch & Bunker will lease the McKennon bakery and supply all the baked foodstuffs for the grocery store.

When Messrs. Pattison assume the management of the grocery store, the same arrangement will in all probability be carried on. Messrs. Roesch & Bunker will use their own establishment and lease the McKennon place supplying a full line of baked foodstuffs for the Pattisons.
