GATHERING AT FAIRVIEW

BRYAN NOTIFICATION TO TAKE PLACE TOMORROW.

Bryan Awaits Patiently the Glad News That He Has Been Chosen as the Democratic Standard Bearer at Denver—Keynote of Campaign to Be Sounded in Acceptance Speech.

Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 11.—William J. Bryan will be formally notified of his presidential nomination tomorrow and Lincoln is already filling up with visitors in advance of the momentous event. All roads lead to Fairview today, where the great Nebraskan is awaiting in all patience the breaking of the glad news tomorrow. Scores of democratic leaders are already here and Mr. Bryan held numerous conferences today. Despite the fact that he is perhaps the busiest man in the country, however, he finds time to greet the Nebraska admirers, many of whom are farmers who have come with their families to Lincoln to take part in the general jubilation and to see the man whom they confidently greet as "the next president."

While Lincoln, as a normally republican city, has not always supported Mr. Bryan in his presidential aspirations, the people universally admire him as a man and are proud of him as a citizen. This pride is today evidenced in the decorations, the flags, banners and Bryan pictures, which line the streets. Republicans have joined with democrats in thus honoring Mr. Bryan and there are few business houses and residences which do not bear some evidence of the admiration which the occupants entertain for Lincoln's most famous citizen.

Every arrangement has been made for properly entertaining the throngs which will be here tomorrow to hear the commoner's speech of acceptance. The notification ceremonies will take place at Mr. Bryan's suburban home, Fairview, and the stage setting of the great event will be of a distinctively rural character.

The newspaper men who have flocked to Fairview from all over the land have found quarters in a large tent erected on the grounds, especially for their convenience. The news-sleuths of the press have an able ally in Mr. Bryan's secretary, Robert F. Rose, a former newspaper man.

Mr. Rose was the Associated Press correspondent assigned to cover Mr. Bryan's first campaign. After that battle he became secretary to the publisher of the Commoner. Now he is on the job at Fairview doing the heavy work. Mr. Rose himself occupies a small tent immediately in the rear of the Bryan residence, where he sleeps with his boots on.

Mr. Bryan's speech of acceptance will be, in some respects, an answer to that of Judge Taft. He will reaffirm all the policies adopted at the Denver convention, and will pay special attention to the anti-injunction plank, the bank deposit guarantee and campaign fund publicity.

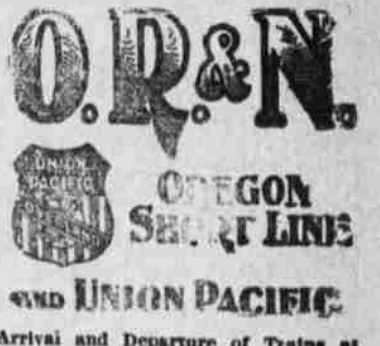
