



Old Orchard Beach, Me., Aug. 11. New England Conference of the Christian Socialist Fellowship was ommenced today on the camp meeting grounds here, with many clerical disciples of Marx in attendance. The Rev. Dr. John D, Long, of the fashde Presbyterian church, Brooklyn, is the leader in the movement for organizing the socialist clergy. Dr. Long states that since March. when he undertook the work of organizing the socialist ministers of the country, his list of those at least sympathetic with the movement has grown until he has now approximately 1500 names. He expects by Labor day. when, with the names signed to it, the Ministers' Manifesto will be given to the press, to have at least 2000 signatures for publication. Secretary Long states that the Fellowship is now represented in 25 states and territories.
