### Special Train Excursion to Portland and the Seashore.

The O. R. & N. Before the money coming in to the growers from that source is fairly well in circulation, the wheat crop will be harvested and threshed, and there will then be thousands of dollars put in circulation again. To these two classes of business revivers, will be added the apple crop later in the fall.
