CIRCUS DAY IN ALL ITS GLORY

EVERY POINT IN THE VALLEY SENDS VISITORS.

Barnum & Bailey Circus is Here—Big Crowds—Lively Business for Merchants and Everybody is Happy—No Stands Down Town and Crowds Center Around Tented City—Show to Leave Tonight for Walla Walla, Its Next Stopping Place.

Barnum & Bailey's circus is here and with it are hundreds of people from valley points and the city is a live mass of humanity today.

In four sections the circus arrived from Baker City during the early hours of the morning, but though it was barely daylight when the animal train arrived, there was a great crowd of children at the railroad yards to welcome it to the city.

Circus day is invariably a signal for big business among the merchants and today's affair proved no exception.

Parade Disappointing.

The parade, for a circus so really great as the Barnum & Bailey shows, was not up to expectations. The floats were very pretty and the bands in a class by itself over the usual run of circus musical organizations, but the grade of horseflesh exhibited on the streets was a disappointment.

The Circus Different.

Though the parade was not up to the expectations held out for it, the afternoon performance was one long to be remembered. Thousands saw the many thrilling acts.

The evening performance promises to be well attended. The afternoon crowds, of course, are always the largest, but so many of the city are planning on taking advantage of the evening performance that the show tent will undoubtedly be the mecca of thousands tonight again.

Crowds Seldom Larger.

A solid mass of men, women and children marked the line of parade. For blocks the sidewalks were lined with anxious spectators, many of whom had held a particular suitable point of vantage for an hour before the 28-horse float which followed the heralds hove into sight.

To Walla Walla Next.

After its two performances here this afternoon and tonight, the big circus leaves for Walla Walla. The O. R. & N. has made ample preparations for handling the four large sections promptly and as soon as the last show is over, the transportation of the gigantic circus will commence. Pendleton will only see the circus as it passes over the O. R. & N.

Contrary to custom the downtown streets were void of the concession business. As a result the idle crowd hovered around the city of tents on the hill.

BRYAN WILL NOT COME TO COAST

URGENTLY REQUESTED TO, BUT CAN'T SEE WAY CLEAR.

Believing That a Stumping Tour of the West Would Be a Vote Getter, Leading Democrats Urge Bryan to Come West—Can't See Way Clear—Big Conference Today to Arrange for Ceremonies Tomorrow—Bryan Interested in Western Trip.

Lincoln, Aug. 11.—Charles Edelman, a member of the notification committee, today appealed to Bryan to visit the Pacific coast on a stumping tour. He assured Bryan if he will come he will have a good chance of winning the electoral vote of Oregon, Washington and California.

Bryan was interested in the request, but did not indicate that he will be able to make the trip. A conference was held today by Bryan, Kern and National Chairman Mack, with other big democrats, to discuss the campaign plans and arrangements for notification ceremonies tomorrow. Al is ready for the ceremony. The city is rapidly filling. The leaders of the party from all parts of the country are filling the hotels to overflowing.
