DELEGATE IS HOME

County Judge and Mrs. J. C. Henry returned this morning from Portland, where Judge Henry was in attendance at the State Good Roads convention.

One of the features of the session was an auto ride through portions of Wasco, Multnomah and Marion counties. The latter county has more miles of good roads than any county in the state.

The convention appointed a committee to prepare a bill to be introduced in the next legislature to secure a state appropriation of \$10,000 for each county for a period of 10 years, providing the counties make a similar appropriation for road work.

Nearly every county in the state is making arrangements to conduct a campaign which will result in permanent work. That is, the road work may be consolidated so that the work which is done will be of a permanent nature and not a mere skinning over the entire county.
