TWO TRAINS DELAYED

The last two westbound passenger trains have encountered wrecks. No. 5, due here last evening, was five hours late on account of a derailed derrick near Weatherby. The wrecker was sent out from here and as soon as the track was cleared, No. 5 proceeded on its way, reaching here at 2 o'clock this morning.

No. 1 Delayed.

Westbound passenger due here at 9:25 this morning, was held in Idaho several hours today on account of a wreck on the O. S. L. News of the accident is meager, though it is not likely that any one is hurt, for, if such were the case, more intelligence would have been forthcoming. One report has it that a freight train wreck is holding No. 1, while another says a coach of the passenger itself is derailed. The train is marked up to reach La Grande at 5:05 this evening.

HUNTERS NUMEROUS

When the bird law opened at midnight, scores of guns were in readiness to be taken to the haunts of the grouse. That the birds will suffer from this time on until the season closes again is evident by the number of licenses that have been taken out during the last few days. The county clerk's office reports 260 licenses sold thus far this year, but a comparatively large number of these were issued during the last month and especially during the last few days.

Tomorrow the hills will resound with the crack of the rifle, judging from the number of local gun men who are planning on going to the hills for the day.

LOW RATES SOON.

Colonist Rates From the East Effective on September First.

Fifteen days more and the colonist rates from the east to Oregon over the Harriman lines will be in effect. It is said that all available cars of the sleeper nature are being rushed to the east now, and that the transcontinental railroad can handle the crowds with ease when the rush starts. Immigration is always spasmodic, and as the influx of settlers last spring was not as heavy as the year previous, it is believed that this year will see an unprecedented rush to Oregon.

JAPAN DELAYS ACTION.

Will Not Spend Fifty Millions on Army and Navy Until 1911.

Tokio, Aug. 15.—As the result of a secret conference between the new cabinet, the premier and ministers of war and navy, it was announced today that it has decided to postpone the expenditure of \$50,000,000 on the army and navy from next year until 1911.

The determination to spend that amount was reported immediately after the war with Russia.

Esperanto Convention.

Dresden, Aug. 15.—While German is the language usually spoken in Dresden, few uninitiated visitors to the city would suspect it, since the hotels are filled with delegates to the Fourth International Esperanto congress, opened today. Disciples of the new universal language from all the nations of Europe, with a sprinkling of delegates from the United States and Latin American, are thronging the city. In honor of the visitors, Dresden has been swathed in green, the Esperanto color, while the Esperanto flag floats from hundreds of buildings. The green star, the Esperanto emblem of hope, is worn by thousands, and the shopkeepers display in their windows the announcement, "Onj Paroles Esperanto"—Esperanto spoken here.
