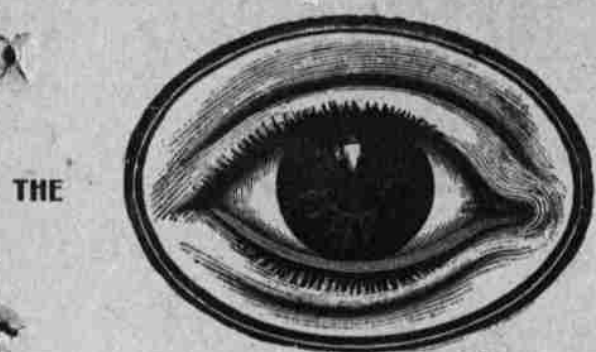

TRAINMEN FIGHT FIRES

These are strenuous times for the railroad boys. Everything is so dry that a spark soon makes a small prairie fire unless it is immediately stopped. That is true on the branch lines. The through passenger trains have to make their schedules irrespective of what follows.

The boys on the Elgin branch are earning their money all right. This is not the snap that many seem to think it is. Yesterday, while coming in with Conductor Grady, the train stopped no less than three times to put out fires which, if permitted to run wild, would have threatened several grain fields.

In the cupola of every caboose sits a man apparently with nothing to do, but his eagle eye is watching the rear of the train and to him is daily entrusted thousands of dollars' worth of grain. While there have been scores of fires along the right of way, no serious loss has been done this season, all due to the carefulness of the train boys.

IMBLER OATS YIELD IS GOOD

THREE THRESHERS WORKING
IMBLER VICINITY NOW.

Average Wheat Crops Assured and the Threshers Showing 30 to 45 Bushels of Oats to the Acre—Imbler Farmers Are Elated—Other Items.

Imbler, Aug. 8.—(Special.)—Farmers are half through harvesting their oats, and with three threshing machines working in the immediate vicinity, there is no delay in sight. Farmers in this prosperous community are extremely happy. Their wheat has run from 30, in the lowest instances, to 45 bushels per acre, and thus far in the oats fields the threshers find the yield will run from 30 to 45 bushels.

Activity in harvest is not confined to the fields alone, but to the large granaries as well, for teams are daily hauling bushels by the hundreds to the elevators.

The crew which is repairing the mill recently purchased by the Imbler Flouring Mill company, is exerting all its energies to complete the work as rapidly as possible that the large quantities of wheat can be made into flour at once.
