ELECTRIC STORM UNHARMFUL.

No Damage Reported From Last Night's Severe Electric Storm.

A small hurricane, short but heavy showers, and severe electrical disturbances put the electric light company's wires out of working order for a short time. No reports have been received of damage done to either telephones, or cattle. The rain was not sufficient to do much good. The heavy winds blew some fruit from the trees, near town, but the damage done is slight.

TWO OF FREAK CATS DIE.

Remarkable Phenomenon in Feline World is Ended by Death.
