PARTY REACHES LA GRANDE EN ROUTE TO FAR EAST.

With a Remarkable Trip Before Them and Already Having Covered More Than Three Thousand Miles, a Party of Kennewick People Arrive in the City—Take Oregon Trail From Here—A Wonderful Undertaking.

Starting from Los Angeles, going into Mexico, then back to Los Angeles, San Francisco, Portland, Spokane, Lewiston, Kennewick and finally reaching La Grande after traveling 3269.9 miles in a 20-horse power Maxwell touring car, and with the remainder of the globe yet before them, is the remarkable journey of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Hover, formerly of Kennewick, Wash. Intending to criss-cross the American continent, to tour Europe, Egypt, China, Japan, Australia and Africa, these two daring people started out in a light car, and nothing more entertaining can be imagined than to listen to Mr. Hover relate the harrowing experiences he and his wife have already gone through. At this stage of their journey, they have only encountered a few miles of impassable road. They came directly here from Walla Walla lake, and rested here today for a time, while their machine was being overhauled at the Smith garage.

Traveling Slowly.

All alone, the two are taking life easy. They are not racers, but are enjoying the scenery and the people as they go by easy stages. The car which will be used on rough roads is a wonder in hill climbing, but has a limited speed capacity. Later, when they reach good roads, they will have a larger machine.

Follow Oregon Trail.

This afternoon the car was started on its trip across the continent. The Oregon trail will be followed to the Missouri river. From there they go to Chicago, Buffalo, Toronto, back to Buffalo, and after visiting all the big cities of that section of the United States, expect to reach New York in October. From there they ship to Algiers, for a long tour of the interior. Up the river Nile to places of interest, and where an auto car can be operated, they will spend still more time. Three years will be devoted in criss-crossing every country in Europe. Their homeward journey will complete the last lap of the world's tour. By steamer to China, touring that country with their auto; by steamer to Japan for additional tourist by steamer to Australia for more touring, and then back to Los Angeles, is a rough outline of their great trip.

The car in which they are traveling already bears the auto licenses of Mexico and California, the latter allowing them to tour any part of the United States, but when the people again see Los Angeles, they will have an auto license from practically every country in the world.

Mr. Hover is a retired business man of Kennewick, and is seeking improved health while seeing the world. They have been fortunate thus far with only a few minor mishaps.
