AN ALFALFA MEAL MILL

The first alfalfa meal mill ever to be operated in the inland empire is now about ready to start at Echo, J. E. Murphy, proprietor of the plant, is in the city today after supplies, preparatory to starting up and is enthusiastic over the prospects. He expects to buy large quantities of alfalfa and will grind it into meal to be sold to dairymen and cattle feeders. The Echo Register says of the work of starting the mill:

Mr. Murphy is crowding his alfalfa meal mill to completion as rapidly as possible, and hopes to set the wheels in motion next week.

The stackrack was raised Tuesday of this week and the brick work surrounding the boiler was completed yesterday. The cement foundation for the engine was run into the mould and the cement floor was completed on Wednesday. Contracts calling for the delivery of products to this plant makes its early operation imperative.

Mr. Murphy will contract to take the alfalfa crop at a stipulated price per ton for the next five years, this guaranteeing to alfalfa growers from 48 to \$64 per acre.

In a region where alfalfa thrives as it does in the Grande Ronde valley, it would not be amiss to make experiments with the new industry. This county produces some of the finest alfalfa hay in the eastern section of the state and a meal mill would be a paying proposition here.

The Dallas, Aug. 22.—A very disastrous fire occurred at Boyd yesterday evening when about 2000 bushels of wheat were destroyed. The threshers completed their day's work yesterday about 5 o'clock on the farm of Dick Neal. The grain had been placed in stacks beside the straw which in cleaning the grain, a fire broke out. The fire was extinguished by the time the Neal farm was reached. When after, however, the big pile of grain sacks was observed to be afire, having been ignited from the coals.
