The Summerville Sawmill company closed a successful run last Saturday and the 75 men employed by the company have been let go until next spring when the mill will again resume its run.

From now on, the company officials will devote their time to shipments, which have now assumed an average of more than one car a day, destined principally to Idaho, Montana and Wisconsin.

Mr. Bach, one of the active proprietors, is in the city today and is optimistic over the outlook for increased business in both this particular line and every other industry during the fall months.

PENDLETON DARK.

Dam Flooded and Monday Night Found Pendleton in Darkness.

There will be no electric lights for Pendleton Monday evening, but if the estimates of the electric company officials prove correct, the power will be on again about noon Tuesday.

During the fore part of last night the reservoir above the N. W. G. Co.'s power plant near Milton, was flooded as a result of a heavy storm and the overflowing water interfered with the operation of the plant.

Particulars of the damage to the plant are meager, but according to the advices received at the local electrical office from the power plant superintendent, the reservoir was broken to some extent. This necessitates a shutting down of the plant and it will require another day to get the plant back in working order.

The lights went out in Pendleton shortly before 12 o'clock last night, and there has been no current today. —Pendleton East Oregonian.

After Men for Northwestern. George C. Thompson, superintendent of construction on the new Northwestern railroad that is building up Snake river, is in the city today to hire men for construction work and on other business, says the Baker City Herald.

He stated that work on the big tunnel was about one-third finished. There has been a delay because of low water in Snake river impeding their plans in rafting timbers to different points on the new line where needed.

One hundred and twenty-five men are at work now on the railroad building. Double shifts are run and no time is being lost. Everything is lively along the line, and there is apparently no possibility of a cessation of activity.

At the Oxbow power project preliminary work is going on. Cabins are being erected, camps organized and about 40 men are now employed there.
