KESN NOTIFIED OF NOMINATION

Openly opposed the remedial measures requested by labor for the alleviation of workingmen from opposition, defied the will of three-fourths of the members by refusing to permit a proposed bill to pass on committee rules. The only relief, proposed by Cannon himself, is to remove him from his position.

Bell, in his notification speech, said: "The lines of battle are being drawn for one of the severest political contests in the history of the country. You will be able to show that the republican party has been unfaithful to its trust."

Victory or Death.

"This is the time we either make a complete surrender to corporate misrule or we redeem for once and for all the heirlooms of the nation from the corporation's pawnshop in which they were hypothecated by the party in power."

He declared the conservation cry of the republicans is a counterfeit of the greatest character: that the republican policies now being disseminated is the microbe of commercialism that now threatens religious and fraternal instincts that raised men above the brute.

"The full dinner pail of four years ago has proved a sham. You will be able to show Taft that he is attempting to reach a whole public through the mirror that is likely to leave him on November 3, where he started on June 15. If Taft is elected the spirit of the departed Roosevelt will be found behind the throne directing the new onslaught against corporations."

SUPREME COURT UPHOLDS LANE

SUPREME COURT ACTS

ON WAYMIRE SCANDAL.

By Affirming Decision of the Lower Court, the Supreme Court Dishes Out Further Exoneration of Harry Lane—Two Defendants Convicted of Placing Portland's Mayor in Compromising Position—Caused Great Scandal at the Time.

Salem, Aug. 25.—An opinion was rendered today by Chief Justice Bean in which the verdict of the lower court in the famous case of the State vs. Belle Waymire and E. E. Radding was affirmed.

The defendants were charged in the indictment with placing Mayor Harry Lane of Portland, in a compromising position with the woman, the details of which are familiar to the public. Both were found guilty and sentenced—the woman to four months in jail, and Radding to six months.

Would Abolish "Law's Delay."

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 25.—One of the most representative gatherings of the legal profession ever assembled in this country marked the opening today of the American Bar association's annual convention. While the majority of the delegates are from the western and coast states, all parts of the union are represented. Many interesting matters are before the convention, chief among them being the reports of the committee appointed to suggest remedies and draft proposed laws to prevent delay and unnecessary cost in litigation. The recommendations of the latter committee are somewhat along the lines of Judge Taft's recent speech, in which he deprecated the "law's delay" and the tendency to give the rich a legal advantage over the poor.

If the suggestions of the committee of the American Bar association shall become law, courts of appeal will no longer decide either civil or criminal litigation brought before them on purely technical points, but will base their rulings on the merits of the case.

This report suggests many changes in the practice in the federal courts for the purpose of expediting the trial of cases, preventing the reversal of judgments on technical grounds, enabling appellate courts to render final judgments on the merits instead of ordering new trials, and preventing appeals for delay in criminal cases.
