SUICIDE IN BAKER CITY

Lying in one of the local undertaking parlors this afternoon is the body of Draper M. Dobbins, death to whom was inflicted by a Colts 38 caliber revolver in his own hands at near 11 o'clock today, says the Herald.

He stepped out of the office of the Baker Iron & Supply house, which is located across the railroad tracks on Auburn avenue and had only taken about three steps when he pulled a revolver from his pocket, held it to his left breast and fired. The bullet did the work, evidently, as the young man had anticipated it would do, for he fell backward on the sidewalk and with a gasp, died. His head was to the west and his feet to the east.

There is no apparent cause for the rash act other than his periodically morose disposition. He has been known to have threatened his life in the past and at times he was very secretive in his talk and manner, indicating that his mind was wrestling with some dire problem. This, however, has been his nature so long that little attention was paid to it. According to friends and associates he was possessed of one of those extreme dispositions—either very jovial and good natured, or very morose. In his fully condition he was decidedly popular with all who knew him and his friends numbered many. He has been employed for some time as night watch at the engineering works.

The sadness of this tragedy is intensified by the fact that the young man comes from an excellent family. His mother died last winter and his father still lives in Alabama and enjoys the confidence of all who know him. Elmer E. Dobbins, brother of the deceased, has been in Baker for some time and is a man among men. In this time of sadness, caused as it is by such an extraordinary occurrence, this whole community extends sympathy.

LAW WORKS HARDSHIPS.

Railroad Men Held in the Mountains for Long Time by 16-Hour Law.

As predicted several months ago when Ed Cross first explained the workings of the 16-hour law in this city, there are bound to be serious disadvantages occasioned. The Pendleton East Oregonian relates the following:

Because of the working of the 16-hour day for railroad employes, some interesting situations are brought out on the mountain division of the O. R. & N., where trains move slowly and where often since the law went into effect, it has been necessary to "tie up" the train crews at a mountain station.

Recently two freight trains reached Dunsmuir, or formerly North Fork station, and because of the expiration of their 16-hour day both were "tied up" there by the officials. As there was no coal for the engines there, nor place for the crews to eat, the engines, five in number, including their helpers, were coupled together and run a Kamela, a distance of 23 miles, where the crews remained until they could resume work under the federal law, which requires 10 hours rest after a 16-hour day.

Several times since the law went into effect crews have been forced to lag at a mountain station until their rest period was up before resuming their run.

While the law works a hardship on the men in this way by keeping them away from their homes during their rest period, it is yet heartily supported by the employes generally and no serious complaints have been made.

The officials make every effort to get a train to the terminal before the expiration of the 16-hour day for the crew, but often accidents happen which make this impossible.
