By electing Lehmann as president, the association clinched an officially-made pledge to use his influence to secure legislation enabling the poor man to stand equal with the rich under the law. Lehmann led the fight Wednesday night, ending in the adoption of a report declaring for the abolishing of appeals on technical error and limiting the jurisdiction of the supreme court of the United States by prohibiting issuing writs of error unless a justice of the supreme court certifies they have probable cause for the belief that there has been a miscarriage of justice.

The business of the convention was finished at noon and the delegates were ready to adjourn when Frank Dominguez of Los Angeles, moved to extend thanks to the suffragettes "who have inspired the delegates to acts of higher statesmanship by their presence." he delegates stood up, doffed their hats and cheered the women. Mrs. Agnes Pease of Denver, clinching her fists, walked down the aisle, shouting:

"Mr. Chairman, the women refuse to accept the thanks of this convention. You need not think you can pass us off with thanks. We are not here to please the men, but here to get the right to take a part in the government. We will not give up this fight."

The convention then adjourned.
