calities. Claiming that the right of way secured by the O. R. & N. more than two years ago is now null and void, Hector McDonald and Mary McDonald forbid the construction crews to proceed on the right of way through the large ranches owned by these two. This action precipitated prompt and decisive methods by the O. R. & N. and today Circuit Judge Knowles, sitting in chambers, issued an injunction restraining the McDonalds from interfering with the contractors or the advancement of the railroad that will bring values untold to the farmers of that county.

The Grounds for Action.

More than two years ago the O. R. & N. secured a right of way through the McDonald ranches and were given a deed for the land. A clause in that agreement stipulates that the road must be built through that right of way within two years. This was not done, and because of this failure on the part of the O. R. & N. the land owners will demand additional right of way money. The injunction granted today overrules the objection of the farmers and will allow the construction work to go on.

To offset this injunction, the defendants must bring action to have the restraining order set aside. Until such litigation is over, the railroad will continue to push on into the heart of Wallowa county.

The injunction papers were rushed to the front this afternoon and will be served on the McDonalds at once.

seeking shelter today from the driving hailstorm which is sweeping the territory, beating down crops and killing sheep by the thousands, leaving a wide path of ruin. The storm is fierce. All means of communication are partially paralyzed. Twenty persons are missing here.

The latest reports describe horrible suffering. It is impossible to learn the exact number of dead, but it is feared many bodies will be found in the canyon below Folsom when the water subsides. All searchers will proceed with the work. Hailstones as big as a quarter dollar are falling at Las Vegas. The railroad bridge is down near Des Moines, N. M., and two houses were washed away at Springer. The wagon roads to Creator are destroyed.

DATE UNDECIDED.

State Convention of Women's Clubs in La Grande Early in November.

Owing to the uncertainty of the date on which the president of the General Federation of Women's clubs in the United States can come to La Grande the Oregon federation cannot announce definitely at this time when the state convention of women's clubs will be held in this city. It will be some time between the first and tenth of November, however. The state board is now working on the program which will form the convention's work here, and have announced that the general president will be here for several addresses, and that they are holding the date open pending the announcement of the high official as to open dates. Included among the addresses for the convention is Mrs. E. C. Moore of this city, who is one of the vice-presidents of the Oregon federation. Her subject is not announced. Within a few weeks active steps will be taken to work out the entertainment features which the Neighborhood club and the Tuesday Musical club will necessarily have to assume. Local club women look forward for a great convention and that La Grande will again do itself proud as a convention city, is foreordained, for the ladies of the city are behind the movement, and anyone conversant with their gift of originality and thrift will admit the statement.

WERE GERMANS SPYING?

English Navy Officials Highly Agitated Over Suspicious Act.

London, Aug. 29.—British naval officers in charge of the torpedo boat maneuvers in the Tyne today are excited by the sudden appearance in their midst of a German torpedo boat, the "D-Five," which is suspected of having been sent on a spying expedition. The German boat was boarded by British officers.

It is expected the matter will become an international affair. "Jingo" papers are agitated. The maneuvers were executed secretly, as the navy was trying the latest developments of torpedo warfare. A conservative view is that if Germany wanted to spy she would have adopted other methods, as the torpedo boat was easily seen.

The Germans explained that the torpedo boat was disabled and was compelled to put in at Tyne for repairs. They disclaimed any intention of spying. The maneuvers were stopped and will be resumed Monday.
