NEWS FROM THE STATE

Portland, Ore., Sept. 7.—(Special correspondence.)—Hillsboro, the prosperous and growing capital of Washington county, is celebrating its second rail connection with Portland, the last being an electric line.

The Oregon State fair opens next Monday, September 14, and continues through the week. The showing of all kinds of products, as well as the livestock and industrial display, and a great race program without pool selling, insures one of the best fairs Oregon has ever held.

Immediately following the Oregon State fair is the Portland Country Club and Livestock show, and it is certain that these two weeks, during which livestock will be foremost in the minds of the people of Oregon, will have much to do with the more rapid development of that important industry.
