READY FOR BIG GRIND

NELSON A STRONG FAVORITE OVER GANS.

No Logical Chance for a Frame-up in Tomorrow's Fight Between the Dane and the Coon—Believed Nelson Will Display Performance of Last Fourth of July.

San Francisco, Sept. 5.—Admission day, a California holiday which has something to do with the history of the Golden State, but which of late years has become chiefly a peg to hang prizefights on, will be celebrated in the usual manner tomorrow at James Croffath's famed Mission street arena. Joseph Gans, the dark dingo of Baltimore and Battling Nelson, who gave said Gans a flogging last Fourth of July, will meet for the third time in what promises to be the biggest pugilistic attraction that San Francisco has known in years. Hundreds of sports from other cities and states, attracted by yesterday's opening performance of the pugilistic carnival, are in the city and every train brings many more. In every cafe, hotel and bar room paper thrusts are discussing tomorrow's contest between the ex-master and the Danish battler and thousands of dollars are being wagered on the result. The Dane is a general favorite, owing to the showing he made in his last fight with Gans, but many crafty ones believe that the black man was "faking" in that fight, and are backing him to win.

The report that Gans has developed tuberculosis has boosted the odds against him, but this only confirms the opinion of those who believe that this is only another of the clever coon's tricks. These wise ones are getting their money down on the dingo and it is rumored that Joe himself is one of the Solomons.

If you listen to these unlicensed fortune tellers they will point out the fact that Gans fell, before his last fight, that Nelson was his meal ticket, so to speak, and that if he killed him off for good there wouldn't be anything for him to do but retire until Paddy McFarland or some of the others thought that he had become sufficiently fossilized to be safe in a 24-foot ring. Right on top of that they remind you that Gans didn't do any boxing in camp, the first time that he ever shirked it, and more particularly on the eve of the battle of his life. No great boxer, is the knowledge imparted, can overlook a whiff with the gloves. No more than could Paderewski duck his three hours daily drobbing of the piano. All they do is to beg you to wait and watch tomorrow's fight.

For agreeing to give Gans another chance to redeem his lost laurels, Nelson is to receive an additional bonus of 10 per cent, which goes whether he wins or loses or draws. Aside from this the money is to be cut up just as it was when the men faced each other in that memorable mixup on July 4. The referee will be paid out of the fighters' share.

There is no hitch as to weight. The
