As it was, she is suffering considerably with a deep gash over the left eye, and a cut on the ear, resulting from a fall from her rig to the sidewalk, in which she struck her head on the curbing. Two rigs and an automobile played important parts in the accident, which was enacted in the briefest imaginable time. The L. C. Smith auto was picking its way through the group of teams standing in front of the N. K. West store and the Farmers & Traders National bank. The first team to take fright belonged to Mr. Cross of Summerville. It shied violently, striking the Grider rig. Mrs. Grider was in the vehicle at the time conversing with a gentleman standing on the ground. When the crash came the gentleman attempted to stop the horses and save Mrs. Grider from a fall. He partially succeeded in both. Peculiarly enough, Mrs. Grider struck the curbing, inflicting only what is really slight injuries. She was taken to Dr. Molitor's office, where she soon recovered from the nervous shock and secured alleviation from the pains. The Cross rig was damaged some.

BIG FREEWATER SHIPMENTS.

More Than Fifty Carloads of Fruit Sent Out Last Week.

Freewater, Ore., Sept. 5.—The fruit shipments from this vicinity during the past week have been the heaviest ever made from here. There has been over 50 cars shipped out in the last week consigned to points in the north, east and south.

The Earl Fruit company of Chicago has purchased 50 carloads of prunes alone from the fruitgrowers' union, and these are now being packed and shipped. The Shields Fruit company and the Walla Walla Produce company, besides doing a big business in this city, are also shipping about three carloads a day from the State line.

This fruit heretofore has either been hauled to Walla Walla or Freewater. The Walla Walla Valley Traction company has just completed a new spur at Freewater, which will also be used for the shipment of prunes by nearly all the shipping houses.

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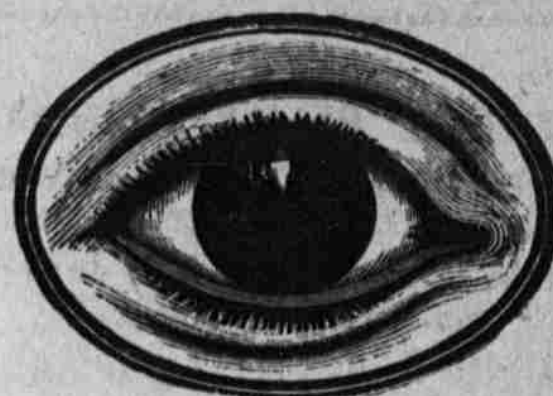
