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ANKENY LOSER IN PRIMARIES IS EARLY SIGN

COSGROVE LEADS THE
GUBERNATORIAL RACE.

Unprecedented Delay Occasioned in Securing Election Returns—Warm Fight in Two Races Yet Undecided, Though Meade and McBride Are Thought to Be Losers—Race in Senate Circles Extremely Warm—Seattle Returns Indicate the Nomination of Wesley Jones, While the Walla Walla District is Undecided.

Seattle, Sept. 9.—Returns from various sections at noon today indicate that Wesley L. Jones of North Yakima, is the choice of the people of Washington for the United States senate, as indicated at the primary polls yesterday. He has a big lead over Levi Ankeny, his opponent and present incumbent. Ankeny will have to poll a heavier vote than was first estimated from the large cities, in order to win.

Judge Snell carried Pierce county in the gubernatorial contests, but Cosgrove is leading Governor Meade, who sought re-nomination, by several thousand. On the east side of the mountains Cosgrove polled 10,000 votes to Meade's one, Ex-Governor William McBride will probably be third. The other candidates for governor are running far behind the leaders.

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PREPARATIONS FOR CONVENTION

EARLY ARRANGEMENTS
FOR THREE BIG DAYS.

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NELSON RETAINS CHAMPIONSHIP

TERRIFIC BATTLE GOES ON
FOR TWENTY-ONE ROUNDS.

With Only Two Rounds in Which Gans Can Be Classed as Equal to His Opponent, the Fight Goes for 21 Sessions—Nelson Fought Like a Fresh Man at the End—Led the Fight Throughout, Though the Coon's Cleverness Told.

Colma, Arena, Sept. 9.—Ringside betting on the Gans-Nelson fight for the lightweight championship of the world this afternoon was even money that Gans would or would not stay 20 rounds of the 45-round grind. Betting on general results at the ringside opened steady, at 10 to 6, Gans people grabbing up money with considerable briskness at that figure.

Statements of the Men.
Battling Nelson said this morning "I will go right after my man and never stop until I get him. It is only a question of how long Gans will last." Joe Gans declared: "The bacon is due to come home with the old master. I am in as good condition as I ever was."

At 2:02 p. m. there was not a vacant seat in the arena. At 2:10 p. m. the pavilion began to fill and it is predicted the receipts will run above \$50,000. Gans and Nelson will fight for 70 per cent of the gate receipts, to be divided 60 and 10 per cent, respectively, to winner and loser. One 6-round preliminary was staged between Collins and McGurn. The men entered the ring for this contest shortly before 2 o'clock and began fighting.

Gans was seconded by Ben Selig, and in Nelson's corner was found Willis Eritl, his chief adviser.

The preliminary between Collins and McGurn was concluded at 2:20 and was declared a draw. Moving pictures were taken of the fight. Gans and Nelson weighed in promptly at 2:30. There was very little betting at that time.

Gans and Nelson are now taking their final rub-down.

Time was called at 3:01 p. m. Nelson entered the ring first, at 2:46. Gans entered the ring a minute later. Gans was introduced by Jordan. Nelson's face was wreathed in smiles. The men then tossed for corners, Gans winning. He chose the southwest corner, with the sun at his back.

Cheers went up for Billy Papke as he took his seat. Several prominent characters were then introduced.

Nelson bandaged his hands tightly with adhesive tape.

Round 1—Nelson rushed to the center quickly, going right after Gans. Gans met him with right uppercut on the body, followed with two similar blows as they broke from a clinch. Nelson forced Gans back, putting a tight left to the body. Gans shot a right and left to the jaw. Nelson drove a hard right to Gans' face, Gans retreating with a right to Nelson's jaw. Nelson continued to bore, but was met by several straight right and

HASTY CONCLUSION OF DUBOIS WARFARE

ANTI-DUBOIS FACTION ANSWERS TO SUPREME COURT.

Arguments Heard This Afternoon to Demand for Mandamus Requiring Filing of Dubois Ticket as the Regular—Serious Charges Made in Answer Filed.

Boise, Sept. 9.—The anti-Dubois faction of the democratic party in Idaho today filed a supreme court answer to the petition of the Dubois faction asking a writ of mandamus requiring the secretary of state to file the Dubois ticket as the regular. The answer charges ex-Senator Dubois and others of conspiracy to take the control of the party from the majority, and turn it over to the "American party," which represents principles other than those represented by the democrats. The arguments were opened this afternoon.

STORMS WRECK BOATS.

London, Sept. 9.—The schooner Phyllis Gray was lost today off Devonshire and a crew of 19 was drowned. The boat was unable to weather the storm sweeping the west coast of the British channel. It is feared the loss of life will be heavy, as many boats were driven ashore.

40,000 HEARD BRYAN'S SPEECH

PEORIA, ILLINOIS, FILLED
WITH LEADING DEMOCRATS.

Regular Speaking Bee Attends Convention of Democratic Party in Illinois Today—Governor Johnson of Minnesota, Principal Speaker for Tonight—Bryan Discusses Paramount Issues of the Day in His Speech Before 40,000 Hearers.

Peoria, Ill., Sept. 9.—It is estimated that 40,000 are here to attend the sessions of the democratic state convention and hear addresses by Bryan and Governor Johnson, and others. When the convention was called to order Adlai Stevenson was introduced, and delivered an address on the issues of the campaign. Early routine business was transacted, and then Bryan answered. After adjournment Bryan talked at the court house square. Tonight Governor Johnson will be the main speaker. Bryan said in part, today:

Bryan's Speech.
"The success of our system of government rests upon the careful observance of the constitutional division of power between the state and nation. A number of expressions have been coined to describe the relations existing between the federal government and the several subdivisions, but no one has more been felicitous in definitions than Jefferson, of more accurate in drawing lines of demarcation. He presented the historic position of the democratic party when he declared himself in favor of the support of the state governments in all their rights, as the most competent administration for our domestic concerns and the surest bulwarks against anti-republican tendencies, and the preservation of the general government in its whole constitutional vigor as the sheet anchor of our safety at home and peace abroad, the democratic platform adopted at Denver, notes the language of Jefferson and declares that it expresses the party's position at this time."

"It would be almost as difficult to maintain a free, self-governing republic over a large area and with a large population without state governments as it would be to maintain such a republic without a general government. The interests of the different parts of the country are so varied, and the matters requiring legislative attention so numerous, that it would be impossible to have all of the work done at the national capitol. One has only to examine the bills introduced in each congress and then add to the number the bills introduced at the legislative sessions of each of the 46 states, to
