NAVIGATE AIR SHIP WITH EASE

AMERICAN AEROPLANE MAKES FINE SHOWING.

Before Large Group of Army Officers Wright in Ohio Establishes a New Mark in Aerial Navigation—Greatest Aviator of the World—Sails an Average Speed of 38 Miles an Hour—Could Have Stayed Up Longer, Still, He Says.

Washington, Sept. 9.—A large crowd of army officials and citizens watched the aeroplane artist, Wright, make a flight in which he one time turned the nose of the ship skyward and sailed up until he reached a height estimated at 120 feet. As a result of today's performance, Wright is considered the world's greatest aviator.

The performance so far outclassed any flight made in public, that it puts Wright, the Ohio flyer, in a class by himself.

"I could have kept going 10 or 15 minutes longer," Wright said, "as I still had gasoline left. The motor

worked perfectly. I shall try again as soon as I reload the tank and inspect the engine."

An average speed of 38 miles an hour, which is two hours less than required under the government contract for a straight away course, was maintained. Wright lifted the machine at times to 60 and 70 feet from the ground.

GANS - NELSON FIGHT

met by two stinging rights to the jaw. Nelson rushed Gans around the ring constantly, but Gans met him with a terrific hook to the stomach and a left to the jaw. Nelson rushed in close, hammering away at Gans' stomach in which he failed to land. Nelson put in two short arm to body and found it. Gans straightened him with a jolt to jaw and a left to the same place. Nelson was not to be denied. He went after Gans at close range and smashed to body twice with hard uppercuts. The rounded ended with right to Gans with a good margin, though Nelson showed no signs of punishment.

Round 8—Nelson closed and shot two lefts to mouth, which started the blood. Then men closed in, Nelson playing for Gans' stomach. Gans contented himself with blocking. Nelson worked away from lefts and rights for body, but invariably located the colored man's gloves. Nelson is breaking up a bit and left an opening which Gans took advantage of, and quickly sent two vicious right uppercuts to the jaw.

Round 9—Nelson rushed fast and Gans blocked. They closed, going clear around the ring, Gans slugging away at Nelson at close range; Nelson brought a left to Gans' jaw; Nelson's right leads were rather low and caused the crowd to yell in disfavor. The blows, however, did not land. Nelson got in two rights and a left to the stomach. As the men fought closely together the bell ended the round in Nelson's favor.

Round 10—Nelson came up strong but was met with a right to the jaw. After some clinching Nelson uncorked a right swing to the jaw; Nelson then quickly closed, beating a tattoo on the stomach of Gans. They continued to indulge, Nelson constantly pressing his opponent and playing on the stomach. Gans shot a hard right to the body and followed with short arm rights and left to jaw. The men constantly fought head to head. Gans sent in two right uppercuts, in return for which Nelson used his elbow, catching Gans on the jaw. The crowd hooted Nelson. Nelson was cautioned by the referee. The round was even.

Round 11—Nelson came up like a 2-year-old. He rushed at close range

and continued fighting it up. Gans was kept on the defensive. Nelson drove Gans against the ropes and landed on the jaw. Gans sallied forth and gave Nelson as good a blow as he sent. He landed several light uppercuts to the head and jaw; Nelson went after his man with great fury, and landed several to the jaw. Gans looked a bit groggy as he went to his corner. This was clearly Nelson's round.

Round 12—Nelson went right after Gans; Nelson swung left to Gans' head; Gans looking for chance to land body blows. Nelson left an opening and Gans shot a terrific right to the jaw. It was a heavy punch, but in no way stopped Nelson's wonderful slugging. Nelson pressed Gans to the ropes and nearly sent him through with right and left swings to the jaw. Gans hung on in desperation and at this stage looked like a dead man. His face bore marks of Nelson's many punches and he seemed content to hang on.

In the following round Nelson pranced to center and landed a vicious right to body. Gans' mouth bled. Suddenly Gans caught Nelson with a right and left to the mouth and blood ran from Nelson's mouth in streams.

This was the second round in the fight that could be called even money. In the 16th, 17th, 18th, 19th and 20th it was the same old story, Nelson forcing the fight throughout. In the 21st round Nelson won the fight with a knockout.

San Francisco, Sept. 6.—Eugene V. Debs, the socialist candidate for the presidency, will probably have to speak in the open air in a small fraternity home Saturday when he is to address the students of Stanford university. He has been denied the use of the famous Stanford church on the ground that the chapel can be used only for religious services.

New York Solon Tenacious.

Ithaca, N. Y., Sept. 7.—Defeated for renomination because he voted against the anti-race track gambling bills last winter, State Senator Owen Cashidy announced today he will make the race as an independent. Ben Conger, a prominent church man, who supported Governor Hughes, was named in Cashidy's place. When the racing bills were tied up in the senate, only one vote was needed to swing the result and Cashidy remained doubtful till the last minute, voting "No."
