DEAD MAN NOT A HOBO

Baker City, Sept. 11.—The Herald says:

Returning from Huntington this morning, where he had been holding an inquest over the remains of John E. Ergle, Coroner Isom stated to a reporter for the Herald that the man came to his death by being crushed between two cars.

The story of the accident as told by the dead man's friend and companion takes away the first belief that the man was a hobo and at once attracts attention to the tragedy. John Ergle was a miller by trade and resided in Denver. His friend is also a man of education and intelligence. Together they sought the golden west as business in their lines was dull in Denver. To the harvest fields was this ambition, and like many men en route for such places, they were not paying railroad fare, but were riding freight trains instead. At Huntington, while a freight train was switching, Ergle crawled between two cars to secure a place for making his journey. It so happened that one of the cars was short a drawhead and when the train was backed the cars squeezed Ergle's life out. Reaction of the cars opened the space between them and his body was permitted to drop on the track and seven cars ran over it, severing the right leg and left arm. He was dead when picked up. Relatives live in Denver and they have been informed of the accident. Where they will have the remains buried is not known.
