TROUBLES IN STORE

COURT'S ORDER MEANS RUINATION OF YARDS.

Judge Bean of Pendleton Rules That North Side Road Must Be Reopened—Will Necessitate Tearing Up Acres of Yard Tracks Now Connecting Palmer Mill With Lumber Piles.

Unlimited litigation is in sight over the decision of Circuit Judge Bean of Pendleton, made yesterday evening, and if carried out, the order will mean that the intricate tracks that now run from the Palmer mill to the company's yards, will be torn up to permit reopening the old road. This piece of road, approximately three-fourths of a mile long, was vacated by the county court to make room for the George Palmer mill. The vacation included the district between the west line of the Cad Rynearson ranch to the Oro Dell bridge. Since the vacation, dozens and even hundreds of narrow gauge yard tracks have been laid, and if the decision of the judge is carried out, the road will amputate the mill from its yards. It is freely predicted that litigation will follow immediately in an effort to forestall the order of the circuit court. At present, residents of the north side of the river, cross the river at the George Palmer lumber mill, and reach the Oro Dell road at the stockyards. The decision of the court came after action brought by several petitioners residing on the north side of the river.

INSPECTING RIGHT OF WAY

HIGH OFFICIALS LEAVE PRIVATE CAR AT WALLOWA.

Traveling by Team, General Manager of Harriman Lines, Goes to the Extreme Terminal of the Extension.

J. P. O'Brien, general manager of the Harriman lines in Oregon, Division Engineer Boschke and General Roadmaster Bollins, accompanied by a large party of Portland people, are today inspecting the O. R. & N. right of way from Wallowa to Joseph. The party reached here this morning from Portland in the manager's private car 61, and immediately started for Wallowa. The trip was made by rail to the first city, but from there the trip was made by team. The purpose of the visit is to inspect the right of way and to locate definitely the depot sites at Enterprise and Joseph. It is planned for the officials to return to this city some time late tonight, the return trip by rail being scheduled to take place at night.

The trip will be a strenuous one, as it implies 50 odd miles by team, aside from the 60-mile trip to Wallowa by rail.

COLORADO REPUBLICANS

Denver, Col., Sept. 11.—Colorado republican politicians are gathering today in advance of the state convention of the party, which will be held tomorrow. The democrats held their convention in Pueblo rather earlier in the week, and the political campaign will soon be on in full blast.

Leaders of both parties are exhibiting a great deal of confidence. Many bitter criticisms have been directed at the Rev. Henry Buchtel since he became the republican governor of Colorado and personalities will likely figure largely in the fight.

Republican politicians express the conviction that Taft is certain to carry Colorado, but it is admitted that Bryan has made many adherents in this

state. In 1896 the Nebraskan received the overwhelming plurality of 134,882. In 1900 the democratic plurality was 29,861, and in 1904 Roosevelt carried the state by 34,582. There is no doubt that the personal popularity of the president was largely responsible for the large vote he received. While both Taft and Bryan have many devoted adherents, neither are able to arouse the enthusiasm of the voters as did Roosevelt.

Whether Colorado's electoral vote shall be cast for Bryan or Taft is still uncertain, and until the votes are counted next November, Colorado will remain in the ranks of the doubtful states, to be claimed by both sides. The Hearst party vote will not cut any figure, but the socialists claim to have greatly increased the number of their adherents in the last few years, and the strength of that party may prove a surprise. There is also considerable prohibition sentiment in the state, which is likely to crystallize into votes for Chaffin.
