## ANKENY MAY BRING FIGHT

DENIES HE WILL ABIDE

BY PRIMA FACIE EVIDENCE

Predicted at Spokane That Senator Ankeny, Defeated for Renomination, Will Stay Beaten—May Carry His Fight to Olympia Legislature.

Spokane, Sept. 11.—According to the Chronicle, Senator Levi Ankeny, beaten by Wesley L. Jones in Tuesday's primary, now threatens to defy the vote of the majority and carry the fight to Olympia.

While many of the newly elected legislators are pledged to vote as the majority of the party has dictated, some have ignored or evaded this promise and, of course, the hold-over senators are not bound. Even if Senator Ankeny could gain enough votes for re-election he might be able to maintain a deadlock, leaving the seat in the senate vacant for two years, and renewing the fight with Jones in 1910.

A Chronicle correspondent this morning talked with Senator Ankeny over the telephone and asked him if he would abide by the result of the vote, and he replied: "I cannot state that."

"If you are defeated, will you quit the fight?"

"I cannot say what may be the developments."

"Well, is there a possibility that you will go before the state legislature with your candidacy?"

"I do not know."

Nearly all the newly elected members of the legislature are formally pledged to the senatorial candidate receiving the highest vote on the direct primary.

County Court Proceedings.

In the matter of the appointment of a constable for Cove justice of the peace and constable district. It was ordered that T. W. DeBorde be appointed.

In the matter of the proposed county road petitioned for by F. H. Owsley, et al. It was ordered that the board of county viewers meet at J. D. McKennon's farm on Fox Hill on Thursday, the 10th day of September, 1908, at 10 o'clock a. m., to view and lay out said proposed road.

In the matter of the appointment of a truant officer for school district No. 23. Continued for the term.

In the matter of the cancellation of county warrants, more than seven years old. Ordered that all warrants issued and endorsed by the county treasurer prior to July 1, 1901, which have not been presented for payment are hereby cancelled and all warrants issued more than seven years prior to July 1, 1908, and remaining in the hands of the county clerk are hereby cancelled as provided by law.

In the matter of changing a portion of road No. 586, situated in township 1 north, range 46 E. W. M. It was ordered that the report of the board of county road viewers be approved and a certified copy of the order, plat of said proposed change and

report of board of county road viewers be served upon the owners of the lands proposed to be appropriated as provided by law, citing them to appear on the 8th day of October, 1908, at 10 o'clock a. m., to show cause, if any they have, why said lands should not be appropriated for county road purposes.

In the matter of purchasing a block, No. 275, in the I. O. O. F. cemetery in La Grande, for the burial of paupers. Said block was purchased for the sum of \$40.

In the matter of the application of Mary Huntley for county aid. Said applicant was allowed \$10 per month during the pleasure of the court.

## DISCUSS NEW STATE FARM

Pendleton, Sept. 11.—The East Oregonian said last night:

If President Kerr and his party from the agricultural college reach here tomorrow a public meeting will be held tomorrow night for the purpose of discussing the subject of dry farming and irrigation experiment stations for the county. Up to this time it is not yet known just when he will arrive, as he merely stated in his letters that he is to be here Saturday.

At 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon the board of managers of the Commercial association was called together by President Alexander. The meeting was for the purpose of deciding upon plans for entertaining the party while here and in the absence of definite knowledge as to when they will arrive, the matter was left in the hands of Judge S. A. Lowell.

At the meeting yesterday afternoon Dr. C. J. Smith also participated. For months past he has been interested with others in the subject of an experiment station and through him Senator Bourne has had the subject up with the department of agriculture at Washington.

President Kerr and party are to be in this county Friday and Saturday. Presumably they will spend most of tomorrow in the arid section. They are to be met at Umatilla by D. C. Brownell and Mr. Brownell is to notify the people of this city as to the party's further itinerary.

Bryan-Kern Club in Pendleton.

Tomorrow evening a meeting will be held here for the purpose of forming a Bryan-Kern club and at the time the local democracy will organize for the presidential campaign. The meeting will be held in the room in the Association building formerly occupied by the Graham furniture store, and which is now vacant, says the Pendleton East Oregonian. The decision to form the club was made several evening ago at a meeting of the local democratic committee, and since that time many Bryan-Kern supporters have signed a petition for the formation of the club. Between now and tomorrow evening other names will be added and at that time the regular organization will be formed.

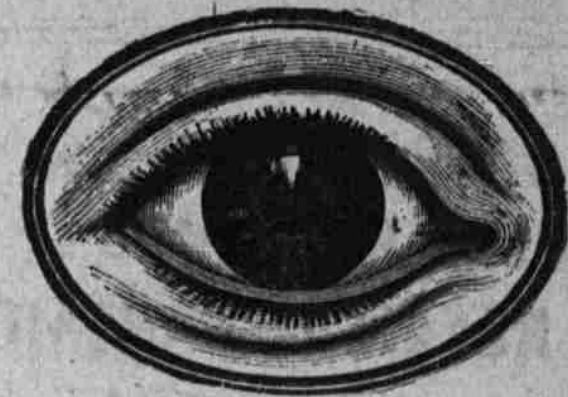
