OFFICIALS VISIT UNION

Union, Sept. 11.—The Republican
said last night:
Some of the directors of the Central
Railway of Oregon arrived in Union
early this week, and have been look-
ing over the company's property in
the section. The party not only made
the trip over the railroad line, but
saw much of the valley by auto, and
Tuesday made the trip up Catherine
creek toward the big timber. The ob-
ject of the trip, as the Republican
understands it, was to inspect the com-
pany's holdings, look over the busi-
ness being done and acquaint them-
selves generally with the lay of the
land along the line of the road. Just
what the net result of the visit will
be can only be surmised, but it is fair
to presume that Union and the Cen-
tral railway will be the gainer by the
visit. The gentlemen composing the
party were Edwin Wilcock of Boston,
president of the Central company, E.
H. England, Charles E. Graham, of
Rochester, N. Y.; Frederick S. Wadell,
of Stockton, Conn.; and Thomas Ross,
of Portland.

County High School Opens.

The Willows county high school
opened Monday with an enrollment of
34 students, and everything in readi-
ness for a successful school year.
Many other eighth grade graduates
from different sections of the county
have informed Prof. Kerns of their
intention to start to the high school
as soon as the fall rush of work is
over and, it is expected, the attend-
ance will more than double that of
last year.—Enterprise Chieftain.

Pendleton Prohibition Day.

According to the Pendleton East
Oregonian the prohibition question was
settled by the people of Umatilla and
other eastern Oregon counties at the
polls last June, but the temperance
movement is not lagging and next
Sunday will be "Temperance Day" at
a number of Pendleton churches.

for the evening services at 7:30. Mr.
Knodell will deliver an address at the
M. E. church, which will be in the
nature of a union meeting.

Mr. Knodell is a forceful speaker
and all of his addresses promise to be
highly entertaining. The public is
cordially invited to attend all the
services.
